A Resource to Know: Illinois Digital Newspaper Collection http://idnc.library.illinois.edu

Digitized by the History, Philosophy, and Newspaper Library, this collection contains 45 newspaper titles, 91,876 issues comprising 1,123,839 pages and 7,192,803 articles. One of the most useful publications documenting University history is the *Daily Illini*, the student newspaper. It is available in full

text from 1874-1975. For information on campus organizations and student activities this resource is a great starting point. With details and photographs of defining moments at the University of Illinois, the *Daily Illini* is useful for both students and advanced scholars.

Alida Cynthia Bowler: Responsibility of Privilege

The Archives blog highlights many of the wonderful students that attended the University of Illinois. In April, Angela Jordan profiled the life of one such student.

"Alida Bowler entered the University in 1908 and in doing so became part of a Progressive Era in education that extended from the 1890s -1930s. To Progressive Era proponents, the purpose of education was not just the acquisition of skills, but the realization of students' potential and the ability to use those skills for the greater good."

Active in many organizations on campus, Ms. Bowler went on to work with the Red Cross during WWI, Russian Refugees in Europe during the 1920s, the U.S. Department of Education, and the Bureau of Indian Affairs where she exemplified a progressive approach.




all events in the Student Life and Culture Archives:

Dean of Students Fred H. Turner was an accomplished individual. Among his many talents, he created Christmas cards from hand-carved wood blocks. Turner chose tulip wood to carve the blocks. The images on this page marked the centennial of the University and the importance of University and Altgeld Hall.

Turner sought images that would signify the centennial, one that would call to mind the University for students and alumni. "In our opinion, the Tower of Altgeld Hall has served as the image of the University for most of the 20th Century." (RS 41/1/20, box 46)

Excerpt from our Historical Student Exhibition

Amelia Alpiner Stern, '96, left an enduring imprint on the University as both a student and an alumna. The Kankakee native took an active part in student affairs: she was a member of the *Illini*, the Alethenai Society, and the Dramatic Club. She also was a founding member of the Illinois Zeta chapter of the Pi Beta Phi sorority—the second sorority to be installed on the campus after Kappa Alpha Theta. [She told a correspondent that "we will probably demand our rights" if the University authorities failed to grant the sorority's petition.] As an alumna, Stern continued her pioneering ways: in 1923 she organized the University of Illinois Mothers Association and became its first president. Forty years later the Mothers Association created a scholarship in her honor. She died in 1969.


