MEETING OF SEPT. 21, 1900.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois met at the Sherman House, Chicago, Ill., at 1:30 o'clock p. m., Friday, Sept. 21, 1900.

The members present were Messrs. Bayliss, Bullard, Hatch, Mc-Kay, McLean and Smith, and Mrs. Flower, Mrs. Carriel and Mrs. Abbott; those absent were Governor Tanner and Messrs. Fulkerson and Nightingale. President Draper was present.

The secretary presented the minutes of the meeting of June 12, 1900. The minutes were approved as presented, but the secretary was instructed to change the third line from the end of paragraph number two in the rule regarding "Leave of Absence" (see page 382) by striking out the word "same" before the word "salary" and inserting after the word "salary" the words, "of his grade."

PURCHASE OF WEST DIVISION HIGH SCHOOL PROPERTY FOR COL-LEGE OF MEDICINE.

Dr. Quine and Dr. Steele of the College of Medicine were then heard with regard to a proposed purchase of the West Division High School property in Chicago for the use of the College of Medicine.

The subject was referred to a special committee, consisting of Mrs. Flower and Messrs. Bullard and Smith, together with the president of the board, Mr. McLean, and the committee was instructed to report at the December meeting of the board, or earlier, if in its judgment further consideration of the matter by the board should not be so long deferred.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM PRESIDENT DRAPER.

CHAMPAIGN, ILL., Sept. 21, 1900.

Io the Board of Irustees:

1. Pursuant to authority given at the June meeting of the board, I have made appointments of the following instructors and assistants for work in the University, and report the same for your information and approval:

Mr. Fred Conrad Koch, Instructor in Chemistry, at \$80.00 per month, for ten months.

Mr. Ira Harris Derby, Instructor in Chemistry, at \$75.00 per month, for ten months.

Mr. Otokar Ludwig Prohaska, Assistant in Chemistry, at \$50.00 per month, for ten months.

Mr. William Maurice Dehn, Assistant in Chemistry, at \$50.00 per month, for ten months.

Mr. Albert Leroy Marsh, Assistant upon the State Water Survey, at \$50.00 per month for 12 months.

Mr. Nathan Austin Weston, Instructor in Economics, at \$80.00 per month, for ten months.

Mr. Hugh Joseph Graham, Assistant in Rhetoric, part time, at \$40.00 per month, for ten months.

Mr. Lewis Archibald Robinson, Assistant in Mathematics in the Preparatory School, at \$40.00 per month, for ten months.

Mr. Roy H. Slocum, Assistant in Theoretical and Applied Mechanics, at \$50.00 per month, for ten months.

Mr. Arthur R. Johnston, Assist in Chemistry, part time, at \$20.00 per month, for ten months.

These appointees have all begun work. It is quite possible that two or three additional instructors or assistants may be required. If so, they will be arranged for as is practicable.

No appointment of an instructor upon the violin has been made, because of the difficulties we have heretofore experienced in that department, and because of the scarcity of competent persons.

The appointments reported by the president were approved at the salaries and for the terms named.

2. At the desire of the school of music, I recommend that the following rule be adopted: "All students in music at the University shall be required to pay an additional fee of \$1.50 each semester, which fee shall entitle such students to one ticket each for all concerts in the concert course of the Choral Society of the University, and students paying this fee shall pay no fee for work in the chorus."

The recommendation was referred to the Committee on Students' Welfare.

3. I recommend the appropriation of \$500.00 to Judge O. A. Harker for expenses and services as lecturer, and organizer and presiding judge of the moot courts in the College of Law for the last University year; and also the same sum for the coming year, to be paid at the end thereof.

An appropriation of \$500.00 was made to pay Judge Harker for services rendered last year. The consideration of his further employment to have charge of the most courts of the College of Law and of the employment of lecturers in that College was referred to the Committee on Instruction for report at the next meeting of the Board.

4. I recommend the appropriation of \$200.00 for equipment in the physilogical laboratory. Professor Kemp's work is proving to be of a very high order, and he has come to be an important factor in the science work of the University. He has been exceedingly patient in the matter of equipment in his laboratory. He feels, as does Dean Forbes, and myself, that a reasonable addition to his equipment, can no longer be delayed.

The appropriation was made.

5. I recommend the appropriation of \$100.00 for the equipment in the department of botany; and also the sums of \$100.00 to the same department to cover ordinary expenses. The latter was in some way inadvertantly omitted from my recommendations at the June meeting.

The appropriations were made.

6. I recommend the approval of the following changes among the officers and employés of the College of Medicine, as recommended by the executive faculty of that College:

That Mr. W. H. Brown be appointed superintendent at the rate of \$125.00 per month from September 1st, in place of Mr. N. M. Verry, resigned.

That Mr. B. F. Jenkins be appointed superintendent of the dispensary at \$40.00 per month in place of Doctor C. C. O'Byrne, resigned; this appointment to take effect the first of August.

That the officers of the College be authorized to employ one nurse for surgical clinics at \$30.00 per month; and one nurse for surgical clinics, half time, at \$15.00 per month.

That Doctor M. M. Babcock be paid at the rate of \$25.00 per month including board and room, as assistant to Doctor Rachelle Yarros, in the department of obstetrics.

That Miss Rowlands be appointed dispensary nurse at \$40.00 a month.

The recommendations of the foregoing paper were adopted.

7. At the June meeting of the Board, I was requested to ask Capt. D. H. Clark to remain as military professor at the previous terms, and, if he declined, to secure the detail of an officer from the regular army as professor of military science. Capt. Clark having declined, I accordingly communicated with the Secretary of War and inquired whether it would be practicable for the department to detail an officer from active service to such a position. I was advised that it would not be, and thereupon requested the Secretary to suggest to me the names of suitable officers who were upon the retired list. This he did, and the result was an interview with Major Edmund G. Fechét, at which was arranged that a detail should be applied for. This was done, and the application was granted and Major Fechét has already entered upon his duties. His service is to be at no expense to the University.

I may add that this officer has been in the service of the United States 40 years, having entered at the beginning of the Civil War, and at the close thereof having been transferred to the regular army. He was retired in 1898. His military service seems to have been a distinguished one, and his experience has certainly been large.

This statement is made for your information, and no action thereupon seems necessary.

No action was deemed necessary on this statement.

§ 8. I recommend that the Committee on Buildings and Grounds be directed to investigate whether some more efficient plan for police and fire protection at the University can not be devised; and, if it seem practicable to do so, that the committee report the details of such plan.

The recommendation was adopted.

9. The University is seriously embarrassed by the loss of the building which was destroyed by fire in June. The best arrangements which we are able to make in order to relieve the embarrassment are altogether inadequate. A considerable part of the instruction and laboratory work in the College of Engineering will have to be omitted for the year, and the want of a gymnasium seriously interferes with both physical training and military work.

In my judgment, a committee should at once take up the question of what we are to do concerning University needs in connection with the approaching session of the General Assembly.

I recommend that such committee be appointed, with instructions to consider thoroughly the whole subject and report thereupon at the next meeting of the board.

The recommendation was adopted and President McLean appointed Messrs. Bullard, Bayliss, and Smith as such committee.

10. The attendance at the summer term this year was 115 as against 148 last year. It is the common remark that the students were more substantial in character, and better prepared, than those of last year. The work seems to have been prosecuted to the general satisfaction of all concerned.

The appropriation for this work by the Board of Trustees was \$2,000.00. The term fees amounted to \$700.00. The payments for instruction amounted to \$2,700.00. The advertising was charged to the advertising account, and probably amounted to \$500.00, so the University was really out of pocket about \$2,500.00 by reason of the maintenance of the summer's work.

The question ought to be settled now, or at least very soon, whether we shall continue this venture as a permanent feature of our University work. I do not think we ought to attempt to do this without materially enlarging the scope of the work and strengthening the instruction. The attendance can undoubtedly be enlarged by this process.

It is not difficult to see why the attendance fell off this year as against last year. It was because we were unable to add to the offerings, and because the normal schools and other prominent institutions opened summer terms. We can easily recover this loss and considerably enlarge the attendance by enlarging our offerings and making the announcements earlier. There is, at least, some satisfaction in having felt the ground under our feet and gained some confidence as to what we can certainly do.

I think all will agree with me that we should either give up this enterprise, or enlarge it. On the whole, I am in favor of going on with it, and strengthening it. We need to procure a few workers from outside, and to cater specially to students, and to teachers; and we need also to organize a more complete system for managing and energizing the whole undertaking. This can easily enough be done if we can have the money with which to do it.

It is quite possible that we can procure a special appropriation for the purpose of meeting the expenses of this work, but we cannot wait until we know the result of an application for such appropriation before we decide what we shall do and begin to make our announcements.

I am in favor of deciding now that we will put at least \$5,000.00 into the work of the Summer Term for 1901, and that the maintenance of a summer term shall become a permanent part of University policy, and I so recommend.

This recommendation was adopted and the appropriation was made.

11. I present herewith the estimates of the Dean of the College of Agriculture and Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station for the next quarter, and recommend that they be approved, and appropriations made therefor as follows:

Appropriations were made in accordance with the estimates of the foregoing papers.

12. The annual national convention of Agricultural Colleges and Experiment Stations will be held at New Haven, Connecticut, in November. We are entitled to one delegate representing the College, and one representing the Experiment Station. It seems to me that we should be represented in important meetings whenever practicable, and I think this one exceedingly important. I should like it if both the agricultural and mechanical sides of our work could be represented. It is usual for the agricultual and mechanical colleges, as well as the experiment stations of the State universities to be represented at this meeting, and it is coming to be more common to see that representatives attend from the mechanical departments as well as from the agricultural.

I suggest that you authorize such representation, and authorize me to make suitable arrangements about it.

It was voted that President McLean be appointed a delegate from the University to the convention named above and that President Draper appoint one or two other delegates-

13. The registration at the opening of the University is large beyond all precedent. Up to last night, considerably more than 600 new students had been registered at the seat of the University. I suppose the new students in the College of Medicine, and the School of Pharmacy, will reach quite 300. The growth is very evenly distributed throughout nearly all of the departments, and practically all of the departments are overruning. Many of them are crowded beyond their capacity for instruction. It is apparently imperative that three or four additional instructors be employed, and I ask your authoriy to arrange for them.

As an item of interest, and to the end that a suitable record may be made, I advise you that the attendance of freshmen and sophomore students in the military department will apparently reach 500, and that it has been determined to make a regimental organization. This will consist of two battalions, of three companies each. The whole will be commanded by a cadet lieutenant-colonel, and each of the battalions by a major. Application has been made to the War Department for additional arms and supplies.

Authority was given to secure additional instructors as needed.

The presentation of these papers was interrupted by a hearing given to Captain D. H. Clark.

After the hearing Mr. Smith offered the following resolution which was adopted:

Whereas, Captain D. H. Clark of the United States army, was employed by the University of Illinois, as Professor of Military Science and Tactics for the ten months beginning September 1, 1899, and

Whereas, Said Captain Clark discharged the duties of such professorship to the full satisfaction of the Board of Trustees of said University, for said term, and

Whereas, Said Captain Clark is unwilling to remain in the service of said University at such salary as the said Board is willing to pay,

Therefore, Resolved by the Board of Trustees of said University that it consents to the retirement of said Captain Clark from such service with regret.

Mr. Smith moved that the University pay Captain Clark \$360.00 to cover the amount of commutations regularly received by a captain in active service but not received by him while detailed for service at the University.

Mr. Bayliss moved as a substitute to refer the whole question as to what, if anything, should be paid Captain Clark to the Committee on Finance, with instructions to report at the next regular meeting of the Board.

Mr. McKay moved to amend to the effect that the Board order the payment of \$539.75 to Captain Clark, the sum to be receipted for by him in full of all demands against the University.

On this amendment the roll was called and the amendment was lost by the following vote: Yeas—Mr. McKay, Mrs. Carriel and Mrs. Abbott; nays—Messrs. Bayliss, Bullard, McLean, Smith and Mrs. Flower; absent—Governor Tanner and Messrs. Fulkerson, Hatch and Nightingale.

The substitute was then adopted.

On motion of Mr. Smith \$100.00 was appropriated for the benefit of the Athletic Association.

The work of the State Laboratory of Natural History during the past two years has consisted, as heretofore, essentially of a continuation of the natural history survey of the State. The field work has been conducted mainly from the Biological Station as a center, and has been limited to the aquatic zoölogy and botany of the State. Work was resumed last year upon a systematic and thoroughgoing study of the fishes of the State, carried on by methods in some respects new and peculiar. This ichthyological work is all directed towards the conclusion of an elaborate report upon the fishes of the State which I have for some years had in hand, and a considerable part of the manuscript for which is already prepared.

Mr. Wallace Craig occupied the Biological Station for nearly one year, mainly engaged on a study of the local distribution of the different species of fish in the Station field, their movements, their habits, and their relations generally. For this work I had a large number of stationary nets prepared, of uniform size and character. These were placed in different situations and visited at regular intervals, the catch being in each case examined as to species and number of specimens of each. Seines of various sorts were used at the same time in connection with these stationary nets, a series of operations being carried on throughout the year, part of the time, of course, under the ice. The whole product of the work has been tabulated and studied with a view to arriving at general results. A paper on this subject will presently be ready for the press.

With the removal of the Station equipment to Meredosia in April, 1899, similar work was undertaken there and has been carried on since that time with certain interruptions for work outside the Station field. Extensive trips have been made by a wagon party equipped for aquatic work of streams, under the charge of Mr. Thomas Large, ichthyologist of the State Laboratory. One such party is now in the field in the western and southern part of the State. A large number of collections have also been made by high school principals and science teachers in various parts of the State and sent to the State Laboratory in aid of this ichthyological survey. Sets of collecting apparatus and materials for the preservation of fishes were prepared at the Laboratory and offered for use, by correspondence, to those whom we thought likely to be interested and helpful in this work, with the inducement of a named series of the specimens collected to be returned to the local public school. This proposition has been enthusiastically accepted, and the plan has worked admirably in every way.

A beginning in the preparation of illustrations for the ichthyological report was made this summer, Miss Hart, the artist of the State Laboratory, spending a considerable part of the season at Meredosia, where the aquarium was established with a continuous flow of water to keep fishes alive, and from these colored drawings were made under the constant supervision of Mr. Large, accurate in technical detail, and true to life in color and general appearance. A reproduction of these exquisite drawings by a method in keeping with their quality will call for a special appropriation of some thousands of dollars, but will give us a more finished series of plates of American freshwater fishes than has yet been published. It is my purpose to illustrate every species by such a plate, with black and white figures additional to exhibit technical characters.

The so-called plankton work of the survey has also been steadily prosecuted under the immediate direction of Dr. Kofoid. Upon his appointment last August to the department of zoölogy in the University of California, I secured for him a leave of absence until January 1, to enable him to complete an analysis, tabulation, and discussion of the results of this work, accumulated during the last five years, and to prepare manuscript for publication. This is by far the largest and most valuable body of work on the minute plant and animal life of a river system which has ever been brought together, and the publication of this paper will contribute in a very notable way to the progress of knowledge in this department.

Work on aquatic insects has been more or less systematically pursued by Mr. Hart, and a paper jointly prepared by himself, Mr. C. C. Adams, formerly a laboratory assistant, and Prof. J. G. Needham, now of Lake Forest University, is in my hands for publication.

As several years have elapsed since the last distribution of natural history specimens to public schools, during which many thousand of named duplicates have been accumulated, I began last winter preparations for another distribution of surplus material, and sent to 20 schools a first installment of such collections. This installment consisted of marine and fresh-water specimens in alcohol and formalin, the marine material being that derived from the Exposition aquarium at the close of the Columbian Exposition, and the fresh-water specimens being accumulated in the course of our regular work. Several months' work of one assistant was devoted to this distribution and preparations for a much larger distribution of insects and other dried specimens. This work will be finished during the present winter.

The publications of the State Laboratory during the last two years comprise nine bulletin articles, containing 238 pages and illustrated by six plates. These articles are purely technical, valuable to students of their subjects, but of comparatively little immediate educational utility. The ichthyological report on the other hand, will be prepared with a view to presenting an exhaustive statement of our knowledge concerning the species of fishes of the State from the standpoint of the ichthyologist, but also all the facts and inferences concerning our native fishes of interest to the fisherman, the science teacher, the amateur student, and the ordinary intelligent citizen.

The rapidly growing interest in nature study, and the urgent and increasing call for materials available to the science teacher lead me to believe that

the State Laboratory may do education a service at this time by giving its periodical publications a different form and direction. While brief technical papers should undoubtedly be published from time to time as new results of merely scientific value are obtained, I intend that our principal bulletin articles shall be prepared with the needs of the science teacher and the advanced science student especially in mind. A considerable demand has, in fact, already sprung up for such bulletin articles as we now publish, college professors especially seeking for them eagerly as a means to a knowledge of the zoölogy and botany of their immediate neighborhoods.

Increased activity in publication has enabled us in the last two years to establish a larger and much more valuable system of exchange than heretofore, especially with European scientific societies and institutions. We are now receiving in exchange for our State Laboratory bulletin 181 periodical scientific publications, of which 59 are American, 28 are British, or British colonial, 26 are German, 16 are French, 12 Italian, and the remaining 40 are Russian, Swedish, Norwegian, Danish, Dutch, Hungarian, Portuguese, Egyptian, South American and Japanese.

Dr. C. A. Kofoid has tendered to me his resignation of his position as assistant in the State Laboratory of Natural History, a position which, in his case, involved the superintendency of the Biological Station, and the nominal rank of an assistant professor of zoölogy in the University. This resignation is in consequence of an appointment received by him as assistant professor of zoölogy in the University of California. With the leave until January 1st, kindly granted to him on our behalf by the University of California, I can to advantage dispense with a Station superintendent for the remainder of the present appropriations period, and I recommend that his resignation be accepted, and that for the present no appointment be made to the vacancy thus created. His withdrawal from active Station work has necessitated some redistribution of service among the remaining members of the Laboratory staff; and I have to report for your approval the following list of assignments and salaries for the fiscal year now current: Thomas Large, Ichthyological assistant, at \$55 a month; H. C. Forbes, Business Agent and Librarian, at \$100 a month, and Mary J. Snyder, Secretary, and Lydia M. Hart, Artist, on the same terms as last year.

I assume that the foregoing brief statement will serve the purpose of the Board as a guide to such action as I may have from time to time to request of them, but, according to my usual custom, I have undertaken the preparation of a more detailed and comprehensive report and discussion of our operations for general circulation, and I have to request, as heretofore, the privilege of substituting such a comprehensive paper for the present preliminary report in the transactions of the Board of Trustees. A special edition of this biennial report, as you will remember, I am accustomed to print in pamphlet form for general distribution to those likely to be interested in our work.

The Committee on Agriculture presented the following report which was approved and appropriations were made as therein recommended:

CHICAGO, Sept. 21, 1900.

Io the Board of Irustees of the University of Illinois:

The Committee on Agriculture begs leave to recommend that, as the balance of last year's agricultural fund was, July 1st, as follows: United States fund, \$3,536.17; endowment fund, \$617.88; farm fund, \$1,916.74; total, \$6,070.79; and, as \$5,000.00 of this was appropriated at the last meeting, the balance \$1,070.79 be appropriated for the purchase of apparatus, refrigerating plant, etc., for the agricultural building.

The balance of Experiment Station funds, July 1st, was \$663.46, of which \$97.21 has been expended during the current quarter, leaving \$566.25. There will come to the Experiment Station from the State Board of Agriculture for analysis of fertilizers the sum of \$350, which together with the balance makes \$916.25. Your Committee recommends that this amount be appropriated for equipment of the College of Agriculture, and in addition thereto any balance which may exist at the end of the present quarter.

It is estimated that the income of the College of Agriculture the present year will be as follows: U. S. \$12,500.00; interest on endowment fund, \$13,500.00; farm fund, \$3,000.00. Total, \$29,000.00. Of this amount there will be required for salaries \$13,608.00, leaving for maintenance \$15,320.00. Of this last amount there has been appropriated for the current quarter \$3,900.00. Your Committee recommends that the salaries for instructors in domestic science be paid from farm receipts.

Your Committee further recommends that the silos recently constructed be paid for from the special appropriation of \$2,000.00, and that for this purpose \$400.00, or so much thereof as may be needed, be appropriated.

Your Committee also recommends that the cattle barn and the house occupied by Professor Davenport be wired for electric lighting and that \$200.00 from the same fund be appropriated for this purpose.

The Committee also recommends that an appropriation of \$600.00 be made to supply steam heat for the agricultural building, the money to be paid from balances not otherwise appropriated. Respectfully submitted,

Your Committee on Buildings and Grounds to which was referred a petition of the Mayor, Board of Local Improvement and certain property owners of the city of Champaign, to the effect that the University aid in opening a street on the south side of the city limits of Champaign from Wright street west to Fourth street, begs leave to report that in the opinion of your Committee the benefits of the said streets would be enjoyed by the said property owners, and that, as they have the means within themselves to open the street, there is no occasion for the University to give land for one-half of said street, as the petitioners request.

We look upon it as true that the University authorities are in sympathy with the spirit of improvement exhibited in both the cities of Champaign and Urbana, and that it will aid important improvements where its aid is necessary to the success of the undertaking, and where there is a compensating benefit to the University, either directly or indirectly.

For the reasons above stated we recommend that the Board of Trustees do not comply with the request of the petitioners, and that the Secretary of the Board notify the petitioners of the action of this Board in regard thereto.

COAL CONTRACT.

The Committee on Buildings and Grounds made the following report of its action with regard to contracting for coal for the ensuing year:

CHICAGO, Sept. 21, 1900.

To the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois.

Your Committee on Buildings and Grounds to which was referred the purchase of coal for the year ending Aug. 31, 1901, begs leave to report as follows:

Your Committee decided to call for approximately 6,000 tons of pea coal to be delivered during the year, and early in July caused the following call for bids to be published for ten days in the two daily papers of Champaign and the one of Urbana. In addition thereto your Committee sent type-written copies of the same call to 34 firms and companies which supply our mine coal in this State—all at the time known to your Committee.

PROPOSALS FOR COAL.

The Committee on Buildings and Grounds of the University of Illinois will receive, till 10:00 o'clock a. m., July 17, 1900, sealed proposals for 6,000 tons, more or less, of best Illinois coal to be delivered f. o. b. cars at Urbana, or Champaign, Ill., for the University of Illinois. The coal will be of size known as pea coal and will pass through a 1^12 inch screen and over a 38 screen.

The coal will be delivered with regularity between Sept. 1, 1900, and Aug. 31, 1901, as needed by the University for heating, lighting and power purposes. Bids for smaller amounts than the whole will be preferred so that at least two contracts may be made.

Quality and price will be considered in awarding the contracts.

A bond or other satisfactory guarnty will be required for the fulfillment of the contract, subject to conditions over which the contractor has no control.

The right is reserved to reject any and all proposals.

After consideration of the proposals it was voted by the committee to award the contract to the Riverton Coal Co., Chicago, on their giving bond and entering into contract.

The committee entered into a contract with the Riverton Coal Co. after the company had filed a bond for \$2,000 for the faithful performance of their part of the contract. Both a copy of the contract and the bond have been filed in the office of the secretary of this board. We submit a copy of the contract herewith and desire to have it printed as a part of this report.

CONTRACT MADE FOR COAL IN DUPLICATE.

It is hereby agreed by and between the Riverton Coal Co., of Chicago, Ill., and the University of Illinois, located at Urbana, Ill., that:

- (1) The said Riverton Coal Company shall furnish to the University six thousand (6,000) tons, more or less, as the said University of Illinois may elect, of best quality of pea coal from the mines of Riverton, Illinois, the said pea coal to be of such sized pieces as to pass over a 3-8 inch screen and through a $1^{1}2$ inch screen in the ordinary process of separating lump from screened coals at the mines.
- (2) The coal shall be delivered on the Wabash railroad tracks at Champaign, Ill., between the dates of this instrument and Aug. 31, 1901, in such amounts and at such times as may be required for use by the said University of Illinois as per instructions from said University.
- (3) It is understood and agreed that if the said Riverton Coal Co. fails to furnish coal of quality and quantity stated as needed for use in the heating, lighting, and power plant of the said University of Illinois, then the said Riverton Coal Co. shall pay the difference between the cost of the fuel, which the University of Illinois may buy and the contract price stated herein as and for liquidated damages.

In order to make less probable a dearth of coal at the University, both parties hereto shall endeavor to keep constantly in the coal bins of the University heating plant and in bunkers near the railroad tracks at least two weeks' supply of coal for the heating plant of the said University.

(4) It is understood and agreed that the shipments under this contract shall be subject to strikes, blockades, shortage of cars, and other causes beyond the control of the said Riverton Coal Company; but the said Riverton Coal Company shall make every possible endeavor to avoid loss to the University by any of the above causes.

(5) The University of Illinois shall pay for the coal at the price of \$1.20 per net ton delivered at Champaign, railroad weights to govern in all settlements.

The said University will pay the freight on coal as received and deduct the amount from the bill for coal at each monthly settlement.

Payments for coal delivered each month will be made by the 20th day of the following month.

MEETING OF NOVEBER 9, 1900.

The following call for a special meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was issued November 3, 1900:

"By order of the President, Mr. McLean, the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois will hold a special meeting in the Trustees' Rooms, Library Building, Urbana, Illinois, at 9 o'clock a. m., Friday, November 9, 1900, to consider and act upon the report of the committee appointed to examine into the proposed purchase of the West Division high school, in Chicago, for the use of the College of Medicine, and such other business as may be duly presented."

There were present at the meeting. Messrs Bullard, Hatch. McKay, McLean, Nightingale and Smith and Mrs. Flower, Mrs. Carriel, and Mrs. Abbott; absent Governor Tanner and Messrs. Bayliss and Fulkerson. President Draper was present.

PURCHASE OF WEST DIVISION HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING.

Mr. Bullard, from the special committee, made the following report and moved its adoption:

URBANA, Nov. 9, 1900.

Io the Board of Irustees.

Your special committee to consider the request of the College of Medicine for the approval by this Board of the proposal to purchase the West Division high school property in Chicago, reports as follows:

Your committee has taken the time to examine into the needs of the College of Medicine for enlarged quarters, the character and condition of the West Division high school building, the value of said property, the price asked for the same, and probability of the College of Medicine producing a surplus of revenue above expenses should the said building be purchased, and the probable effect of the said purchase upon the contract now in force, and the time of its termination.

After seriously considering the subject and obtaining as much information as possible from parties more conversant with certain phases of the question than your committee we have arrived at the following conclusions:

(1) Your Committee believes that the need of the College for enlargement in its buildings is urgent; that the present building is barely large enough to accommodate the present attendance of 635, and not at all adequate to accommodate the increase of another year or two years. If the College is to grow—and we believe that if it remains a department of the university it must grow then at the farthest we cannot delay a year without doing incalculable injury to the College.

- (2) The West Division high school building occupies a half block of ground, having an area of 42,845.76 square feet and having a possibility of enlargement of 4,272 square feet by the vacation of an alley. This school building is adjoining the building of the College and, if obtained, the whole would really become one piece of property. It is, therefore, for the College, the most desirable piece of property in its vicinity. The building occupies about 27,500 square feet of ground, only about two-thirds of the whole tract. It is three stories high not including the basement, which is a fairly good story for certain purposes. It is well built and is in good condition. It is sufficiently large to accommodate 1,200 high school pupils, has 28 rooms for instruction besides a large assembly room seating 1,250, and three laboratories and other necessary rooms, together with cloak and toilet rooms. The building is much larger than necessary to accommodate the increase of the students in the College of Medicine, for several years, and, therefore, is not an economical investment unless immediate occupancy can be provided by a permanent tenant that would not interfere with the use of the remainder of the building by the College. Your Committee is assured that such an arrangement, entirely agreeable to all parties interested, can be consummated.
- (3) Your Committee has carefully estimated the value of the said property and is of the opinion that it is worth \$170,000 to 175,000.
- (4) The price asked by the Board of Education of the City of Chicago, is \$186,000, and it is the belief of the members of the faculty of the College conversant with the matter that the price fixed by the School Board cannot be reduced at present, and that an attempt to secure a reduction would be at the risk of the withdrawal of the offer at any price. The advantage of having additional buildings on contiguous property makes this property of more value to the College by an indetermined amount than any other. This will in large measure diminish the difference between the two figures.
- (5) Your Committee has been especially particular to determine as accurately as possible the amount of income and expense the Medical College may reasonably expect following the purchase of the said property. It is the desire and determination of the faculty of the College of Medicine to organize a Dental School as a department of the Medical College and have it occupy a part of the new building. We have all also considered the possibility of providing the Pharmacy School of the University with quarters in the building. In this manner we estimate that the building would be well occupied from the opening of school in 1901, and, while there would still be much room for expansion in the College and in each of the schools, the building would be so occupied from the first that an excess of revenue above expense may be safely relied upon the first year, as well as a gradual increase in surplus during succeeding years. The income from the Medical College which will fall to the Medical College purchase and endowment fund of our treasury this year will be sufficient, if continued, to pay out the contract with the College of Physicians and Surgeons within the period of the contract. We estimate that on the most conservative and trustworthy basis the use of the new building by the Medical College would produce sufficient additional surplus each year to pay for the new building, likewise during the term of the contract.
- (6) It was the fear of some members of the Committee that the large cost of this property would so increase the amount now provided for in the contract that the period of fulfillment of the contract would be indefinitely extended. This fact has caused the Committee to be unusually careful in its estimates. Our conclusions are that while the amount of the contract would be increased to about \$400,000, the income to our treasury would amount to \$15,000 a year on an average, which would pay off the total within the original limit of the contract.

Now, in accordance with the conclusions arrived at by your Committe, the following resolutions are presented by your Committee and are recommended for adoption:

WHEREAS, The Medical College of this University is in need of larger quarters for its present and growing attendance; and,

WHEAREAS, The Chicago School Board has offered to sell the West Division high school building of that city; and,

WHEREAS. The said building is adjoining the building of the Medical College and adequate to the needs of the College; and,

WHEREAS, Additional room is desired for the use of the Pharmacy School and for a Dental School, both of which may be housed in the surplus room of the said high school building; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the College of Physicians and Surgeons of the City of Chicago is hereby authorized to purchase the West Division high school property of the City of Chicago, described as lots one (1) to seven (7), inclusive, in block twenty-three (23), also sublots one (1) to seven (7), inclusive, of lots nineteen (19) to twenty-five (25), inclusive, in block twenty-three (23), and the vacated alley running north and south through said block twenty-three (23) in Ashland Second Addition to Chicago, in the west half (\frac{1}{2}\) of the northeast quarter (\frac{1}{4}\) of section eighteen (18), township thirty-nine (39) north, range fourteen (14) east of the third (3d) principal meridian, the said purchase to include the building or buildings thereon, together with the furniture, fixtures and apparatus therein, all of the said property to be acquired for the purposes of the College of Medicine of this University, in accordance with article twelve (12) of an agreement entered into between this University and the College of Physicians and Surgeons on the ninth day of February, A. D. 1900, and that the sum to be paid for the said property be an amount not exceeding one hundred and eighty-six thousand (\\$186,000\) dollars; it is further

Resolved, That the College of Physicians and Surgeons is hereby authorized to make permanent improvements in the building described in the foregoing resolution, after its purchase, for the purposes of the Medical College, to an amount not exceeding five thousand (\$5,000) dollars, in accordance with article 12 of the contract aforesaid.

All of which is respectfully submitted,

Mr. Smith moved to amend by adding to the resolution for the purchase of the property in question the following:

Provided that this purchase shall in no way be allowed to operate to postpone the termination of the contract now in force between the University of Illinois and the College of Physicians and Surgeons, of Chicago, so far as it relates to the University's acquiring the title and receiving the deed for the property described, so as to conform to the provisions of article ten of original contract with the College of Physicians and Surgeons.

Mrs. Abbott moved to amend further by striking out from the

Mrs. Abbott moved to amend further by striking out from the report all reference to the School of Pharmacy and to a proposed dental school.

On this amendment the roll was called and the amendment was lost: Yeas—Mrs. Carriel, Mr. McKay, Mrs. Abbott, and Mr. Hatch; nays—Messrs. McLean, Bullard, Smith and Nightingale and Mrs. Flower; absent, Governor Tanner and Messrs. Fulkerson and Bayliss.

The amendment offered by Mr. Smith was adopted.

Mr. McKay moved to refer the report to the Attorney General for an opinion as to the legality of the proposed plan of purchase.

On montion of Mr. Bullard the motion to refer to the Attorney General was laid on the table.

The roll was then called upon the motion to adopt the report and it was adopted as amended by the following vote: Yeas—Messrs. McLean, Bullard, Smith and Nightingale and Mrs. Flower, Mrs. Carriel, and Mrs. Abbott; nay—Mr. Hatch; absent, Governor Tanner and Messrs. Fulkerson, Bayliss and McKay.

On motion of Mr. Smith, the same special committee was authorized to take such measures as might be necessary to carry into effect the resolution just adopted.

The Committee on Students' Welfare made the following report which was adopted:

URBANA, ILL., Nov. 9, 1900.

To the Board of Trustees.

Your Committee on Student's Welfare, to which was referred the proposition to charge each pupil of the School of Music a fee of \$1.50 a semester or \$3.00 a year, begs leave to report that it has considered the proposition carefully and recommends that the fee be not charged.

RECORD OF BONDS AND SECURITIES.

On motion of Mr. McKay the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That any member or officer of this Board who may purchase or otherwise secure or receive for the Edward Snyder Students' Aid Fund (except notes for loans to students) or for the Medical College Purchase and Endowment Fund any bonds or other evidences of indebtedness shall at once turn over such bonds or other evidences of indebtedness to the Treasurer of this Board.

That the Secretary of this Board shall, as soon as practicable thereafter, inspect such bonds and evidences of indebtedness and after inspecting them, shall make such record of them in a book suitable for the purpose as will serve for their identification, and

That the Secretary shall also make upon all such bonds or other evidences of indebtedness, not already by their terms or by endorsement payable to the University of Illinois, an endorsement showing that they are the property of the University of Illinois and may not be transferred without an order by its Board of Trustees.

Mr. Bullard moved that Mr. J. R. Scott be paid for hauling coal during the year 1899-1900, 3 cents a ton in addition to the contract price for hauling, in accordance with the recommendation of the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds, made at the June meeting of the Board.

The motion was lost.

On recommendation of the Committee on Instruction it was voted that Judge Harker be paid a salary of \$500 for the current year for services in the College Law.

At the September meeting of the Board it was voted that a committee be appointed to consider measures looking to the appointment of a member of the Faculty of the University as State Geologist.

President McLean reported to the Secretary, October 30, that he had appointed the following persons members of such committee: Mrs. Abbott, Mr. Hatch, and Mrs. Carriel.

The following resolution, offered by Mrs. Abbott, was adopted:

STATE GEOLOGIST.

Resolved, that in deciding, at the last meeting, to appoint a committee to secure the appointment of a member of the University Faculty as State Geologist, the Board acted without knowledge of the fact that the matter had been the subject of conference between the professors of geology of this and other leading universities of the State, with a view to an agreement upon a plan of procedure which would best promote the interests of geologic science; that the Board has no purpose to embarrass such conference, or interfere with the results thereof; that pending the fullest consideration of the subject by the scientific men most interested therein, the committee of the Board be requested to take no steps in the matter; that the President of the University, the Dean of the General Faculty, and the Professor of Geology are desired to confer with the authorities of other universities upon the subject, and, if practicable, arrive at an agreement which will secure coöperative action, and that in such event the committee of the Board act in accord with such agreement.

President Draper announced that in accordance with authority given at the September meeting of the Board he had arranged that Prof. S. A. Forbes should attend as a delegate the convention of Agricultural Colleges and Experiment Stations to be held in New Haven, Conn., next week.

The Board adjourned.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM PRESIDENT DRAPER.

Io the Board of Irustees of the University of Illinois:

1. Last spring Miss Elizabeth Sprague was appointed instructor in household science, but has never entered upon the position, because of ill health. It has been expected, all along, that in a little time she would be ready to commence work, but circumstances now seem to make it necessary for her to be released from the engagement altogether, and she has so requested.

I therefore recommend the appointment of Miss Cornelia Elizabeth Simon as assistant in household science for seven months, commencing Dec. 1, 1900, at \$70 per month.

Miss Simon is a graduate of the Lewis Institute, Chicago, and has served one year as assistant in the household science work of that institution.

- 2. I transmit two letters on behalf of students in the College of Law, asking that they be given free scholarships, or that their fees be remitted.
- 3. I transmit a communication from Professor Walter Howe Jones in reference to his salary.
- 4. The reports of the Dean of the College of Agriculture and Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station are herewith transmitted, with the recommendation that the appropriations asked for for the quarter ending March 31, 1901, be made as follows:

PURCHASE OF THE WEST DIVISION HIGH SCHOOL PROPERTY.

The Secretary presented the following communication from the College of Physicians and Surgeons, of Chicago:

CHICAGO, Nov. 15, 1900.

Mr. W. L. Pillsbury, Secretary of the Board of Irustees of the University of Illinois,

DEAR SIR: The following is a copy of part of the minutes of the meeting of the Board of Directors of the College of Physicians and Surgeons, of Chicago, held November 10, 1900, relating to the authorization received by the Board of Directors from the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois for the purchase of the West Division High School property. The part of the minutes in regard to this matter is as follows:

"A communication was presented by the President from the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois authorizing the purchase of the West Division High School property as applied for by the College of Physicians and Surgeons. This communication was read and on motion and second was accepted and placed on file.

On motion and second the Secretary was instructed to notify the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois of the receipt of the approval given by the Board of Trustees to the application of the Board of Directors of the College of Physicians and Surgeons for authority under the contract with the University of Illinois to purchase the West Division High School property at a cost not to exceed \$186,000.00.

He was futher instructed to notify the Board of Trustees that the Board of Directors of the College of Physicians and Surgeons proposes to act upon the authorization." Yours truly,

LEGISLATIVE APPROPRIATIONS.

The committee on legislative appropriations appointed at the September meeting presented the following report:

URBANA, Dec. 11, 1900.

To the Board of Trustees.

Your Committee appointed at the September meeting to consider and report upon applications to the next Legislature for University appropriations makes the following report:

The University has many very urgent needs, but the one which is supreme has been occasioned by the destruction of the Wood Shops, Hydraulic Laboratory, Testing Laboratory, and Gymnasium, by fire, in June last. The complete destruction of the building which housed these different interests has made it necessary to abandon a considerable part of the University work for the present year. In the opinion of your Committee this fire loss should be made good by the Legislature immediately upon assembly. If this is done it is likely that the needs of the different departments referred to can be provided for by the opening of the University year in 1901, The Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds has made careful estimates of the amount of money needed to meet these needs, and advises us that \$76,000.00 will suffice for the construction. This should be asked for as an emergency appropriation, and in the hope of securing it in time to finish construction by the first of September. To accomplish this it will be necessary to have the plans go forward rapidly in anticipation of the appropriation. We recommend that immediately upon the assembling of the Legislature an application be made for an emergency appropriation of \$76,000.00 to accomplish this purpose.

We have very carefully considered the financial conditions and pressing needs of the University. Having in mind the rapid growth of recent years,

and the continuance thereof, and at the same time desiring to reduce our askings to the lowest point consistent with the continued development of the University, we recommend that the following items be asked for in the regular appropriation bill:

- 1. For the payment of taxes accruing in the years 1900 and 1901 on lands owned by the University in the State of Minnesota, and held for the use of the University, the sum of \$1,000.00 per annum.
- 2. For the payment of salaries, for the care of buildings and grounds, and for ordinary operating expenses, the sum of \$175,000.00 per annum.
 - 3. For additions to library, \$15,000.00 per annum.
 - 4. For additions to apparatus and appliances, \$3,000.00 per annum.
 - 5. For materials for shop practice, \$2,000.00 per annum.
 - 6. For increase of scientific cabinets and collections, \$1,000.00 per annum.
 - 7. For fire protection, \$1,500.00 per annum.
 - 8. For laying pavements and walks, \$6,000.00 per annum.
 - 9. For the maintenance of the Vaccine laboratory, \$1,200.00 per annum.
- 10.. For the maintenance and extension of engineering equipment, \$10,-000,00 per annum.
- 11. For painting and repairs on buildings, and improvements to grounds, \$5,000.00 per annum.
 - 12. For carrying on the State water analyses, \$3,000.00.
- 13. For draining, fencing, and repairs on the experiment farms, \$3,000.00 per annum.
- 14. For expenses of a summer term of the University, \$5,000.00 per annum.
- 15. For providing additional teachers in the College of Agriculture, in order to meet the demands for instruction at farmers' institutes, the sum of \$6,000.00 per annum.

Your committee recommends that application for the following additions to the plant be made:

- 1. For payment for deficit in the construction of the Agricultural Building \$10,000.00.
 - 2. For furnishing and equiping the Agricultural Building, \$5,000.00.
 - 3. For the construction of a chemical laboratory, \$150,000,00.
 - 4. For the construction of a woman's building, \$100,000,00.
 - 5. For completing the water plant of the University, \$10,000.00.
- 6. For reconstructing the old Chemical Laboratory so as to make it available for the College of Law or the School of Music, \$10,000.00.
- 7. For the purchase of small parcels of land, surrounded by lands of the University, and needed to make the holdings of the State complete within the general boundary of the University grounds, \$20,000.00.
- 8. For equipment for the Wood Shops, Hydraulic Laboratory, and Men's Gymnasium, destroyed by fire, \$15,000.00.
- 9. For additions to the Central Heating and Lighting Plant to meet the demands of the Agricultural Buildings and a new Gymnasium, Wood Shops, and Testing Laboratory, etc., \$12,000.00.

Respectfully submitted.

S. A. BULLARD, THOMAS J. SMITH, ALFRED BAYLISS, This paper was gone over item by item and the several items were approved except the following:

Mr. McKay moved to increase item 10, for maintenance and extension of the engineering equipment, by making the amount \$25,000.00.

This amendment was defeated by the following vote: Yeas—Mrs. Carriel, Messrs. McKay, Hatch and Nightingale; nays—Messrs. Fulkerson, Bayliss, McLean, Bullard, and Smith and Mrs. Flower and Mrs. Abbott.

It was then moved to make the amount \$20,000.00, and then to amend this motion by substituting \$15,000.00 for \$20,000.00, and the substitute prevailed by the following vote: Yeas—Messrs. Fulkerson, Bayliss, Bullard, McLean, and Smith and Mrs. Flower and Mrs. Abbott; nays—Mrs. Carriel and Messrs. McKay, Hatch, and Nightengale.

It was ordered that instead of \$10,000.00 in item 1, deficiency on Agricultural Building, the amount of the deficiency, as ascertained by the Business Manager, should be inserted.

Mr. Fulkerson moved to amend item 2, for furnishing and equipping the Agricultural Building, by making the amount \$25,000.00.

It was moved as a substitute for this to ask for \$10,000.00 for the year beginning July 1, 1901, and for \$5,000.00 for the year beginning July 1, 1902, and the substitute prevailed by the following vote: Yeas—Messrs. Bayliss, McLean, Bullard, McKay, Smith, Hatch and Nightingale, and Mrs. Flower and Mrs. Carriel; nays—Mr. Fulkerson and Mrs. Abbott.

It was voted that the amount of item 8, for equipment of wood shops, etc., should be added to the \$76,000.00 to be asked for as an emergency appropriation, and that the asking accordingly include not only the amount needed for the buildings, but also the amount needed for equipment.

It was also voted to ask for \$5,000.00 per annum for maintenance of the School of Music.

Mr. McKay moved an extension of the College of Literature and Arts by the establisment of a school of social and political science and commerce, and that an appropriation of \$16,000 00 per annum be asked for for this purpose, and the motion prevailed.

Mr. McKay moved that the Legislature be asked to appropriate to the University, in addition to other amounts, \$35,000.00 a year, in order that the University might thereafter collect no fees from University students.

Before action was taken upon this motion, Mr. Nightingale presented the following resolution:

WHEREAS, The University of Illinois is an integral part of the public school system; and,

WHEREAS, In all the public schools below the University tuition is free; therefore, be it

Resolved by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, That on and after the opening of the college year, September, 1901, tuition in all the regular academic departments of the University (not including the Preparatory School or the professional schools) be free, and that the Legislature be asked to appropriate for the use of the University a sufficient amount, in addition to the usual appropriations, to make good any loss of income hitherto accruing from tuition.

Both the motion and the resolution were referred to the committee of the whole for consideration at a special meeting of the Board, to be called by the President some time prior to Jan. 31, 1901.

The report upon appropriations was then adopted as amended.

The Illinois State Horticultural Society, which was holding its annual meeting in the Agricultural Building at the University, sent an invitation to the Board to visit the Society, and the invitation was accepted for 3:00 o'clock p. m.

Mr. J. R. Scott and Mr. Spencer were heard upon Mr. Scott's claim for additional compensation for hauling coal for the University last year.

After the hearing the Board voted to pay Mr. Scott \$150.00 more.

One hundred dollars was appropriated to complete the payment for the new boilers which had been purchased.

On motion of Mrs. Carriel, it was voted that Professor Burrill's salary be \$4,000.00 a year from Jan. 1, 1901.

STATE GEOLOGIC SURVEY.

The following report of the special committee appointed at the November meeting of the Board was adopted:

To the Board of Irustees of the University of Illinois:

GENTLEMEN:—Your Committee appointed to consider ways and means for the establishment of a geological survey of Illinois, submits the following report of progress:

Your Committee arranged a conference in Chicago with representatives of the other leading universities of the State. Dean Forbes represented this University at the conference, and the suggestions which follow are largely based upon its results.

We believe that conditions are favorable for asking the Legislature to establish a survey of the State so broadly organized as to cover all its geological resources; that this survey should be the creation of the State and not be subjected to special or partisan influence; that political methods should not be used to secure its establishment or support; that in the organization and administration of such survey the interests of geologic science should take precedence of all other considerations; that the work of the survey should be so organized and distributed that all competent geologists connected with the educational institutions of the State may have a share in its prosecution, and that such disposition be made of the results of the survey as will best promote educational ends and subserve the economic interests of the State, and that the principal laboratories of the survey shall be located at the State University.

This action can only be accomplished through legislation, and we recommend that if these suggestions be approved by you, the committee be continued with power to prepare a bill, and take such action as shall seem most likely to secure its passage.

AFTERNOON SESSION, DEC. 11, 1900.

When the Board met after the recess the same members were present as in the forenoon, except Messrs. Bayliss and McKay.

The importation of supplies for the chemical laboratory to the amount of \$2,000.00 was authorized.

A petition was received from the young women of the University asking that there be included in the legislative appropriations a request for an amount sufficient to build and equip a woman's hall and a woman's gymnasium.

MEMORIAL TO PROFESSOR MORROW.

Mr. Smith presented the following preamble and resolutions:

SPRINGFIELD, ILL., Nov. 14, 1900.

WHEREAS, The Illinois Live Stock Breeders' Association is perpetually mindful of the long and efficient service rendered Illinois agriculture by the late Professor George E. Morrow; and,

WHEREAS, It is desirous that some fitting and permanent memorial be placed to his name; therefore, be it

Resolved, That it be requested of the Trustees of the University of Illinois, that the Assembly Room of the Agricultural Building be known as Morrow Hall, and that a suitable tablet be erected to his memory at the entrance of said room.

The following resolution was then offered by Mr. Smith:

Resolved, That in memory and in honor of the long and faithful services of George Espy Morrow, as Professor of Agriculture in the University, the assembly hall in the new Agricultural Building be hereafter known and called Morrow Hall, and that a suitable tablet be placed in said hall with the name of Professor Morrow and with appropriate representations of the facts concerning him.

This matter was referred to the Committee on Agriculture, to report at the next meeting of the Board.

On motion of Mr. McLean, Miss Ethel A. Hampton was granted a scholarship in the University.

Mr. E. E. Chester and Dean Davenport were then heard with regard to a memorial for Professor Morrow, and after the hearing and remarks by President Draper in support of the same, the motion to refer Mr. Smith's resolution was reconsidered and the resolution was adopted.

MEETING OF JANUARY 23, 1901.

The following call for a special meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois was issued Jan. 16, 1901:

"Upon the call of the President, Mr. Alexander McLean, a special meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois will be held at 9:00 o'clock a. m., Wednesday, Jan. 23, 1901, in the Trustees' Room, Library building, Urbana, Ill., to consider the question of fees to be charged students of the University, and such other business as may be duly presented."

There were present at the meeting Messrs. Bayliss, Bullard, Hatch, McKay, McLean, Nightingale and Smith, and Mrs. Carriel and Mrs. Abbott; absent, Governor Yates, Mr. Conrad and Mrs Flower. President Draper was present.

COMMUNICATION FROM PRESIDENT DRAPER.

THE LINCOLN OX-YOKE.

To the Board of Irustees:

For many years there has been in the possession of the University an oxyoke, with black walnut cross-bar and hickory bows, said, and believed, to have been made by Abraham Lincoln. The University, however, had no definite information to authenticate the fact that the relic was really the handiwork of Mr. Lincoln, and all efforts to secure such information were for many years unavailing. At last the matter has been cleared up, and the fact has been established beyond a doubt.

Some weeks ago, Mr. Watson Pickrell, a graduate of the University in the class of 1875, now living at the City of Tempe, in the Territory of Arizona, saw mention of the matter in a newspaper, and at once wrote to Dean Burrill, stating that he procured the ox-yoke from Mr. Clark M. Smith, a resident of the City of Springfield, Ill., and a brother in-law of Mr. Lincoln, in the year 1873, and brought the same to the University; that Mr. Smith stated to him that he purchased the same at a public sale held in New Salem, Ill., on the occasion of a visit to New Salem by Mr. Lincoln and himself just after Mr. Lincoln's term in Congress; that Mr. Lincoln and himself just after Mr. Lincoln's term in Congress; that Mr. Lincoln was present at such sale, at the time of said purchase, and that said ox-yoke was announced as having been made by Mr. Lincoln, and the announcement was by him acknowledged to be true; that Mr. Smith purchased the same as a souvenir because made by his brother-in-law and a member of Congress, and had kept the same in his store until delivered to Mr. Pickrell to be given to the University of Illinois in 1873.

These facts stated by Mr. Pickrell and fully corroborated, and some additional facts added thereto, by Mr. John S. Condell, Sr., now nearly 90 years of age, yet living at Springfield, Ill., and who in 1873, and for several years prior thereto, was a partner in business with Mr. Smith, under the firm name of C. M. Smith & Co.; and also by Mr. Albert M. Smith, a son of Mr. Clark M. Smith, now living in Springfield.

Mr. Condell says that the ox-yoke was kept at the place of business of C. M. Smith & Co. for many years; that upon the nomination of Mr. Lincoln to the Presidency it was placed in a conspicuous place in the counting room of the firm and was much talked about; that Mr. Smith took great pleasure in showing it to his friends and former customers, in giving them its history, and in telling them what his brother-in-law, Mr. Lincoln, said about it.

Mr. Condell says that Mr. Pickrell frequently besought Mr. Clark M. Smith to give the ox-yoke to the University, and after a number of conversations, and much hesitancy, he determined to do so, and authorized Mr. Pickrell to take it and present it, in his. Mr. Smith's, behalf, to the University. So the facts are indisputably established that the ox-yoke was made by Mr. Lincoln, at New Salem, probably about 1830; that it was purchased by his brother-in-law, in his presence, in the year 1849; that it was retained by the purchaser until 1873; and that at the earnest solicitation of Mr. Watson Pickrell it was given to the University by Mr. Clark M. Smith; and that Mr. Pickrell brought and deposited it in our collections.

I have caused affidavits to be prepared and executed by Mr. Pickrell and Mr. Condell, the business partner of Mr. C. M. Smith at the time the gift was made, in order that the University might have and retain an authentication of the facts in due form, which affidavits are as follows:

"United States of America, Territory of Arizona, County of Maricopa, ss.: Watson Pickrell, being duly sworn, says that he is a graduate of the University of Illinois, in the class of 1875, and is now a resident of the City of Tempe, Territory of Arizona; that in the year 1873 he presented to the University of Illinois an ox-yoke made by Abraham Lincoln; that his knowledge that the said ox-yoke was made by Mr. Lincoln is based upon the following facts, namely: That the yoke was given to this deponent by Mr. Clark M. Smith, late of the City of Springfield, Ill.; that Mr. Smith was a brother-in-law to Mr. Lincoln, and a man of well-known and high repute; that Mr. Smith stated to deponent that soon after Mr. Lincoln returned to Illinois from his term in Congress, Mr. Lincoln and he (Smith) together visited near New Salem, Menard County, Ill., where Mr. Lincoln once lived; that while there they attended a public auction of farm chattels, among which was the oxyoke; that the yoke was announced at the auction, in the presence of Mr. Lincoln, as having been made by Mr. Lincoln, and that the announcement was by him acknowledged as true; that it was looked upon and talked about as a curiosity because made by a Congressman; that Mr. Smith bid off the yoke at said auction and retained the same in his possession until he gave it to deponent; that Mr. Smith also stated to deponent that at the time of buying the yoke he had no thought that Mr. Lincoln would ever become President, but that he thought the yoke was worth buying and keeping as a souvenir because made by his brother-in-law and a former member of Congress.

State of Illinois, County of Sangamon, ss.: John S. Condell, Sr., being duly sworn, says that he is a resident of the City of Springfield, Ill.; that in 1873, and for several years previous, he was the business partner of Mr. Clark M. Smith, the brother-in-law of President Lincoln, under the firm

name of C. M. Smith & Co.; that during said years there was in their store an ox-yoke which was frequently the subject of conversation, and that Mr. Smith frequently stated that it was made by Mr. Lincoln when a young man living at New Salem, Ill.; that he (Smith) bought the same as a souvenir at an auction at New Salem soon after Mr. Lincoln's return from Congress, and upon the occasion of a visit to New Salem by Mr. Lincoln and himself; that the yoke was bought in Mr. Lincoln's presence after the public statement that it was made by him and he acknowledged that the statement was true; that said yoke was in the attic of the store for a long time, but that it became an object of interest and value, and was cleaned up and kept in the counting-room for several years; that Mr. Smith took great pleasure in showing it to his friends, especially to farmer customers, and giving them its history and telling them how it came into his possession at New Salem; that Mr. Smith frequently had conversations with Mr. Watson Pickrell, a student at the State University, about giving the yoke to said University, and finally yielded to Mr. Pickrell's request that he should do so, and allowed Mr. Pickrell to take the yoke and present it to the University as coming from Mr. Smith, and Mr. Pickrell took it away for that purpose.

Having been able to establish the facts so clearly, it has seemed well to place the ox-yoke in a favorable and prominent position in the University. Some weeks ago, Hon. James S. McCullough, a resident of the City of Urbana, and now State Auditor of Public Accounts, was good enough to procure some oak boards, which had formed a part of the original flooring in the Lincoln home at Springfield, and send them to the University. These boards have been used to make the frame of a case for the ox-yoke. The whole has been prepared by the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds of the University and mounted in the rotunda of the Library Building.

This communication is presented because of the manifest desirability of having a statement in complete form preserved in the records of the Board of Trustees of the University.

The following resolution was adopted, on suggestion of President Draper:

BOND FOR ARMS.

Resolved. That the University execute, as principal, and deliver to the Government of the United States, a bond in the penal sum of three thousand six hundred and twenty-two dollars for additional ordnance and stores, consisting of one hundred Springfield cadet rifles and sets of equipment, about to be issued to the University for the use of the military department by the Secretary of War, and that Mr. Alexander McLean, President of the Board of Trustees, be and is hereby authorized to sign said bond on behalf of the University, and attach thereto the seal of the University.

President Draper presented a communication from the Illinois Pharmacuetical Association, suggesting three gentlemen, Messrs. H. C. Porter of Rockford, G. M. Bennett of Urbana and Henry Biroth of Chicago, from whom the Board of Trustees should select a member of the Advisory Board of the School of Pharmacy. Upon recommendation of the Committee of the School of Pharmacy, made at the September meeting of the Board, Mr. G. M. Bennett of Urbana was selected for the term expiring in 1905.

A proposition from Mr. John N. Beers with regard to forty acres of land adjoining the south farm was referred to the Committee on Agriculture.

A proposition from the Illinois School of Dentistry was referred to the Committee on the College of Medicine.

President Draper handed to each member of the Board present, as a gift from the Y. W. C. A., the calendar published by the Association, and the Secretary was directed to acknowledge the receipt of these and to return to the Y. W. C. A. the thanks of the members.

ABOLISHING FEES.

The special order for the meeting (see p. 43) was then considered. After much discussion, the previous question having been ordered, Mr McKay's motion

"That the Legislature be asked to appropriate to the University, in addition to other amounts, thirty-five thousand dollars a year, in order that the University might thereafter collect no fees from the University students"

was adopted by the following vote: Yeas—Mrs. Abbott and Mrs. Carriel and Messrs. Hatch, McKay, McLean, Nightingale and Smith; nays—Messrs. Bayliss and Bullard; absent—Governor Yates, Mr. Conrad and Mrs. Flower.

On motion of Mr. Smith, Mrs. Carriel and Mr. Hatch were added to the steering committee.

The Committee on Buildings and Grounds made the following report, which was adopted:

AGRICULTURAL BUILDINGS.

URBANA, ILL., Jan. 23, 1901.

To the Board of Irustees of the University of Illinois.

Your Committee on Buildings and Grounds desires to report that the contracts for the new agricultural buildings have been completed and the buildings accepted and that they are now in use by the agricultural department.

We are gratified to report that Messrs. Valentine Jobst and Sons, the general contractors, Baumgarten Brothers, the plumbing contractors, and Messrs. Thomas and Smith, the steam heating contractors, have all done their work and completed their contracts in a manner satisfactory to the architect, Mr. Llewellyn, and to your Committee.

We wish to say further that in the matter of extra work, some of which seems inevitable in building operations, and in deductions the several contracting firms have been very fair and reasonable in making prices.

We wish also to commend the architect, Mr. Joseph C. Llewellyn, an honored alumnus of this University, for the patience and the painstaking care which he has always maintained throughout this work, that the wishes of the agricultural department and the Agricultural Committee be completely satisfied in the planning and construction of this group of buildings. That he has succeeded in his object, we have the assurances of all the parties deeply interested in the agricultural department. That he has designed a handsome group of buildings, we all know. We believe that the University may look with pride upon this great and artistic addition to its already large collection of buildings.

It is gratifying to your Committee to report that all of this work has been successfully performed without materially exceeding the appropriation. It is seldom that the expenditure in erecting a public building can be confined to a sum less than 5 per cent added to the appropriation. In this case the excess is not beyond $1^{1}2$ per cent. In this estimate there is not included the expense of the increase in the central heating plant which was necessitated by the new buildings.

"For providing additional teachers in the College of Agriculture, and also to meet the demands for instruction at Farmers' Institutes, the sum of \$10,000 per annum."

The Committee also recommends an appropriation of not to exceed \$100.00, to be paid from the State appropriation for buildings and grounds, for the purpose of dressing and oiling the floors of the rooms of the domestic science department.

The Committee also recommends that the executive department of the Illinois Farmers' Institute be invited to recommend to this Board one of their number to serve on the Advisory Board of the Agricultural Experiment Station.

The minority report was then adopted by the same vote.

The following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Board has learned with pleasure of the promotion of Captain Daniel H. Brush, for four years professor of military science and tactics in the University, and now with the army in the Philippines, to the position of Major in the United States army, and hereby sends its congratulations to Major Brush, with its best wishes for his good health and his prosperity.

The Board adjourned until 2:00 o'clock p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

When the Board met pursuant to adjournment the same members were present as in the morning.

At the suggestion of Mr. Bullard, the Board listened to the statement of Mr. Llewellyn, the architect of the Agricultural Buildings, regarding the construction of the buildings.

Mr. McLean offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That a committee of three members of the Board be appointed to suggest and plan for the public dedication of the Agricultural Buildings now completed and to report the same at the March meeting of the Board.

It was ordered that the President of the Board, together with two members to be appointed by him should constitute this committee, and that President Draper should be, ex officio, a member of the committee.

Mr. Smith and Mrs. Carriel were appointed on the committee.

Dr. King, of the College of Medicine, was heard with regard to the organization of a school of dentistry as a department of the College of Medicine.

With regard to this matter the Board adopted, on motion of Mr. Smith, the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Board of Trustees approves the proposition that the College of Medicine establish a department of dentistry, and hereby authorizes the authorities of said College to proceed with the steps leading thereto in conjunction with the Committee of this Board on the College of Medicine and the President of the University, it being understood, however, that nothing should be consummated until first reported and passed upon by this Board.

Upon motion of Mr. Bullard an appropriation was made to meet the deficiency of \$2,226.26, shown by the report of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds, in the excess of liabilities incurred over appropriations for the erection of the Agricultural Buildings.

President McLean called attention to the fact that the Chairman of the Committee on Agriculture, Mr. Fulkerson, was no longer a member of the Board, and appointed Mr. Hatch chairman of that committee.

Mrs. Abbott moved that the salary of Professor Shattuck be made \$3,500.00 a year from the first of January, 1901. The motion prevailed by the following vote: Yeas—Mrs. Abbott and Messrs. Bayliss, Nightingale, McLean and Smith; nays—Mrs. Carriel and Messrs. McKay and Hatch; absent—Governor Yates and Messrs. Bullard and Conrad and Mrs. Flower.

The Board adjourned.

MEETING OF MARCH 12, 1901.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois met in the Trustees' Room, Library Building, Urbana, Illinois, at 9 o'clock a.m., Tuesday, March 12, 1901.

The members present were Messrs. Bayliss, Bullard, Conrad, Hatch, McKay, McLean, Nightingale, and Smith, and Mrs. Carriel, Mrs. Abbott, and Mrs. Alexander; absent, Governor Yates. President Draper was present.

The minutes of the regular meeting of Dec. 11, 1900, and of the special meeting of Jan. 23, 1901, were approved as presented by the Secretary.

On motion of Mr. McLean, Mr. Smith was elected President for the ensuing year.

On motion of Mrs. Carriel, W. L. Pillsbury was re-elected Corresponding and Recording Secretary and Registrar for the ensuing year.

On motion of Mr. McKay, Mr. E. G. Keith was re-elected Treasurer for the ensuing two years.

Mr. McLean and Mr. McKay were elected to constitute, with the President of the Board, Mr. Smith, the Executive Committee of the Board.

Mr. J. Irving Pearce, of Chicago, representing the Illinois State Board of Agriculture, Mr. H. Augustine, of Normal, representing the Illinois State Horticultural Society, and Mr. H. B. Gurler, of DeKalb, representing the Illinois State Dairymen's Association, were appointed members of the Advisory Board of the Agricultural Experiment Station.

President Draper was re-elected President of the University for the ensuing two years.

COMMUNICATION FROM PRESIDENT DRAPER.

Io the Board of Irustees.

I have the honor to make the following recommendations:

1. That Professor Evarts Boutell Greene be given leave of absence next year on half pay, and that the remaining half of his salary be used to make provision for his work.

- 2. That as soon as the emergency bill, making an appropriation for the gymnasium, wood-shop, testing laboratory, and hydraulic laboratory, becomes a law the Committee on Buildings and Grounds be authorized to advertise for bids and enter into contracts for the erection of those buildings.
- 3. That the School of Pharmacy be moved to the College of Medicine upon the expiration of the present lease, and that the Committee on the School of Pharmacy, acting in conjunction with the President and Business Manager of the University, arrange all details to this end.

A communication from the Advisory Board of the School of Pharmacy, bearing upon the matter, is herewith transmitted.

- 4. That the department of botany be authorized to place an order for the importation of supplies from abroad to an amount not exceeding one hundred (\$100.00) dollars, the bill to be paid after July 1, 1901.
- 5. The estimates of the College of Agriculture and of the Agricultural Experiment Station are transmitted and recommended for adoption, as follows:

It is also recommended that from and after March 1, 1902, the south farm be operated upon the Agricultural College and Experiment Station accounts.

It is also recommended that Professor Cyril George Hopkins be authorized to place an order for supplies to be imported for the Station laboratories to an amount not exceeding four hundred dollars, not to be paid before July 1, 1901.

6. That the principal and instructors in the Preparatory Schools be advised that their services will not be desired after the end of the present year, unless in certain cases they be re-engaged, and that the President be authorized to arrange for and report to the next meeting of the Board a new faculty and better accommodations, if possible, for the school.

The special committee upon the reorganization of the School of Music, appointed at the December meeting, makes the following recommendations:

- 1. That the resignation of Professor Walter Howe Jones, to take effect September 1, 1901, and the resignation of Miss Jessie Younge Fox, to take effect at the end of the present term of employment, July 1, 1901, be accepted.
- 2. That Frederick L. Kawrence, of Northfield, Minnesota, be appointed director of the school and professor in charge of the piano department at eighteen hundred (\$1,800.00) dollars per year.
- 3. That Mrs. Eunice Dean Daniels be appointed instructor in piano at eighty (\$80.00) dollars per month for ten months.

SCHOOL OF DENTISTRY.

The Committee on the College of Medicine made the following report which was adopted:

URBANA, ILL., March 12, 1001.

Io the Board of Irustees of the University of Illinois.

Gentlemen: In accordance with the resolution of Jan. 23, 1901, concerning the establishment of a School of Dentistry in connection with the College of Physicians and Surgeons, the Committee which was to act in conjunction with the College of Medicine, reports that steps have been taken to inaugurate such a school at the commencement of the next college year in accordance with arrangements made between the College of Medicine and the Illinois School of Dentistry.

Witnesseth,

WHEREAS, The College of Physicians and Surgeons, of Chicago, to act with the Committee of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois and the President of the said University, has been authorized by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois to organize a department of dentistry in the College of Medicine of said University and,

Whereas, an entirely new organization with a new name, a new faculty, and new equipment, free from the drawbacks, and prejudice against, or known weaknesses of, existing schools of denistry is believed to be highly desirable, and,

WHEREAS, it is also believed to be equally desirable and good policy to acquire the influence, connections, strength, and good will of existing schools of denistry, in so far as these may be so acquired at reasonable cost, and,

WHEREAS, The Board of Directors of the Illinois School of Denistry, of Chicago, a corporation organized under the laws of the State of Illinois, and a well-established and reputable college, with a standard curriculum, a moderate equipment of the value of about \$7,000, a reputable faculty, including several excellent teachers, and an enrollment of more than 100 students at present in attendance upon its instruction, are willing to surrender its charter, sell its equipments, transfer its students, and to lead its best teachers to accept places in the taculty of a new school of dentistry of the College of Medicine of the University of Illinois with reasonable compensation therefor, and,

WHEREAS, the College of Physicians and Surgeons, a corporation existing under the laws of the State of Illinois, and the Illinois School of Dentistry, after full investigation and consideration believe that the interests of both institutions and of the University of Illinois, as well as the interests of public education, will be greatly furthered and promoted by the establishment of a department of denistry in the College of Medicine and the taking over thereto of the Illinois School of Denistry as a beginning and nucleus of the proposed Dental School of the University of Illinois.

Now, therefore, to fulfill the purposes of the College of Physicians and Surgeons and the Illinois School of Dentistry, and to increase the usefulness and greatness of the University of Illinois, the parties hereto have entered into the following agreement: Subject to its approval and acceptance by the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, and subject to the successful transference of the West Division High School to the ownership of the College of Physicians and Surgeons on or about July 1, 1901.

- 1. It is mutually agreed that there shall be organized a department of dentistry of the College of Medicine of the University of Illinois; that it shall have all the rights, privileges, and advantages enjoyed by the other departments of the said College of Medicine and shall be equipped and opened for instruction to classes in dentistry on or about the first of October, 1901. It shall be understood and advertised as strictly a new school and shall be known as the School of Dentistry of the University of Illinois.
- 2. The said Illinois School of Dentistry agrees to transfer its equipment, franchises, memberships, and good will to the College of Physicians and Surgeons in furtherance of the above expressed purposes, and to accept therefor, and for its services in transferring its interest intact to the proposed School of Dentistry of the University of Illinois, the sum of \$17,000.00, payable in 6 per cent. interest bearing bonds of the College of Physicians and Surgeons, the same to be delivered on or about the second day of July, 1901, and the said College of Physicians and Surgeons on its part, in furtherance of the above named purposes, agrees to pay to the Illinois School of Dentistry for said equipment, franchises, memberships, and good will, and for its services in transferring its membership and good will to the proposed School of Dentistry of the University of Illinois, the said sum of \$17,000.00, payable in said bonds, the same to be delivered on or about the second day of July, 1901.
- 3. The said Illinois School of Dentistry agrees to transfer its lease to the premises now occupied by it and to assign its contracts with its teachers to the College of Medicine of the University of Illinois, which transfer and assignments are to take effect on the 15th day of May, 1901, and the said College of Physicians and Surgeons agrees to assume for the benefit of the College of Medicine the obligations of the said lease and the contracts with the said teachers. The said lease herein referred to, for which the College of Physicians and Surgeons becomes responsible, dates from May 15, 1901, and expires May 1, 1904, at a stipulated annual rental of \$3,500. The contracts with teachers for which the College of Physicians and Surgeons becomes liable are for the services of persons during specified time as follows: Dr. D.

- M. Cattell, \$1,650, under contract for 12 months; Dr. C. M. Ditmar, \$1,250, under contract for seven months; Dr. Geo. W. Cook, \$1,200, under contract for 12 months; Dr. E. W. McWhinney, \$550, under contract for seven months; Dr. C. E. Jones, \$900, under contract for 12 months.
- 4. It is mutually agreed that the Illinois School of Dentistry shall continue with full authority and rights to conduct its present school as heretofore until the 15th day of may 1901.
- 5. It is further understood and agreed that the Illinois School of Dentistry shall, on or before the transferrence of its property and the receipt of payment therefor, discharge every obligation and debt standing against the said school, or for which the said school may be held, except the obligations mentioned above in paragraph 3 of this instrument.
- 6. It is mutually understood that the appointments of Mr. R. P. Donaldson for Superintendent of the proposed dental department, and Dr. B. J. Cigrand as Professor of Dental Prosthesis and History, shall be recommended to the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois by the Executive Faculty of the College of Medicine, and that each shall be recommended to receive a salary of \$1,500 per year said salaries to begin on May 15, 1901.
- 7. It is further agreed that a complete itemized inventory of all its property, equipment, and effects, with values attached, shall be furnished by the Illinois School of Dentistry to the actuary of the College of Medicine on or before March 1, 1901.

In witness whereof the Committees of the College of Physicians and Surgeons and the Illinois School of Dentistry, appointed for this purpose and with powers, hereunto set their hands on this 15th day of February, 1901.

TRANSFER OF WEST DIVISION HIGH SCHOOL.

To the Board of Trustees:

Your special committee on the purchase of the West Division High School property by the College of Physicians and Surgeons (Sept. 21, 1900), begs leave to report that in order to complete the purchase of the said property, as authorized by the Board, it will be necessary to authorize an increase of the indebtedness of the said College in accordance with Article 10 of the contract between the College of Physicians and Surgeons and the University of Illinois dated the ninth day of February, 1900.

Your committee therefore recommends the adoption of the following preamble and resolutions:

Whereas, by a resolution passed by this Board November 9, 1900, the College of Physicians and Surgeons of the City of Chicago was authorized to purchase for \$186,000 from the City of Chicago the property known as the West Division High School, which property is fully legally described in said resolution, and

Whereas, the said College of Physicians and Surgeons was further authorized on the same date to make permanent improvements to the building on said property to an amount not exceeding \$5,000, and

Whereas. January 23, 1901, this Board by resolution authorized the College of Physicians and Surgeons to organize a School of Dentistry in said College of Medicine, and did on the 12th day of March, 1901, approve an agreement between the College of Physicians and Surgeons and the Illinois School of Dentistry, whereby the organization of a School of Dentistry in the College of Physicians and Surgeons is to be consummated by the purchase of the Illinois School of Dentistry for the sum of \$17,000 and

Whereas, it is the intention of the College of Physicians and Surgeons to improve permanently the present building of the said College at a cost not to exceed \$8,000, and to place therein the new School of Dentistry; now therefore, for the accomplishment of the above purposes, be it

Resolved, that the College of Physicians and Surgeons be and is hereby authorized and permitted to increase its indebtedness to the amount and in manner as follows: On first mortgage against said West Division High School property to the Chicago Board of Eduction for five years at 6 per cent interest the sum of \$86,000. In bonds of the corporation and secured by a second mortgage against said High School property running from 10 to 20 years at 6 per cent interest, the sum of \$109,000. And it is further

Resolved, that it be permitted to change the form of indebtedness of the College of Physicians and Surgeons secured by mortgage against the present

building legally described in the contract between the said College of Physicians and Surgeons and the University of Illinois, dated the ninth day of February, 1900, and amounting to \$21,000, from a note to bonds of the College of Physicians and Surgeons at a less rate of interest, not to exceed 6 per cent per annum, the said bonds to be secured by a mortgage on the said property.

NEW BUILDINGS.

Mr. Bullard, chairman of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds, reported that some revision of the plans and specifications for the three new buildings had been made since the last meeting of the Board, and that the two lowest bidders for the general contract and for the contract for heating and plumbing, had been asked to revise their bids in accordance with these changes.

Upon opening these bids it was found that on the general contract V. Jobst & Sons' bid was \$72,346 and Kelley & O'Brien's bid was \$66,034.

On the heating and plumbing contract J. D. Wallace's bid was \$9,466 and Field, Shorb & Company's bid was \$8,675.

As a result of some further modifications of the plans and specifications Kelley & O'Brien's bid stood \$67,342 and was accepted.

The Committee on Building and Grounds, together with the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds, Mr. Spencer, was instructed to have the plans and specifications completed according to the proposed revision and to have a contract drawn; and the President and Secretary of the Board were authorized to sign the contract with Kelley & O'Brien upon their furnishing satisfactory bond as called for by the specification.

The bid of Field, Shorb & Co. was accepted and it was ordered that a contract be drawn and signed and bond given, as in the case of the general contract.

Mr. Bullard, for the Committee on Building and Grounds, recommended that the bid put in by V. Jobst & Sons for the construction of the water plant and the tunnels be accepted and that a contract be drawn and signed when the contractors furnished a satisfactory bond, and it was so ordered.

Advisory Board of the Experiment Station.

Upon the recommendation of the Illinois Farmers' Institute, Mr. S. Noble King, of Bloomington, was appointed the representative of the Institute upon the Advisory Board of the Experiment Station. Messrs. Hatch and Conrad of the Board of Trustees, President Draper, Dr. Burrill, Dr. Forbes, and Professor Davenport were appointed as representatives of the Board of Trustees and of the Faculty upon the Advisory Board, and President Draper was appointed President of the Advisory Board.

NEW PAVEMENTS.

The following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the President and Secretary of the Board be, and are hereby, instructed to sign a petition for the pavement of Wright street, in Champaign, from the south side of John street to the south side of Daniel street, one block, with brick upon a broken stone concrete foundation, and for a concrete combination curb and gutter.

The Board also voted that it would favor paving Romine street and Springfield and Mathews avenues adjoining the University premises, in Urbana, whenever the owners of property adjacent thereto will agree to such paving.

The Committee on Buildings and Grounds, to which was referred at the last meeting of the Board a communication from Mr. Hess, reported back the communication without recommendation, and the report was accepted.

The same Committee returned the proposition from the Light, Heat & Power Company of Urbana with reference to furnishing light and power during the vacation, with the recommendation that it be not accepted, inasmuch as the University would be compelled to run its own plant for the larger part of the time, and the recommendation was adopted.

The same Committee also returned the request made by Mr. J. A. Reeves that the University pay demurrage claims, with the recommendation that it be not granted, and the recommendation prevailed.

The Board adjourned.

The erection of new and larger shops creates the need of additional help in them. For several years, in connection with the head of the department of mechanical engineering, I have been very anxious to add a professor or assistant professor of machine design to that department. It also seems necessistant professor of machine design to that department. It also seems necessary to add an assistant or instructor in the machine shop. It is estimated that the first of these could be secured for \$1,600.00 per annum, and the second for \$700.00 per annum. The need of an instructor in municipal and sanitary engineering is quite apparent. This would likely cost \$1,000.00 a year. Some progress has been made in looking for suitable men for such positions, but any definite recommendation is not yet practicable. It is recommended that the President be authorized to pursue the search and, if deemed best close arrangements for such positions within the amounts deemed best, close arrangements for such positions within the amounts named.

There are a number of instructorships now existing for which I have not recommended appointments, for the reason that I am not yet ready. The increase of students at the opening of the fall semester is very likely to create exigencies which must be met. I recommend that you authorize me to act in

such cases and report as soon as practicable.

AMENDMENTS TO THE UNIVERSITY STATUTES TOUCHING ORGANIZATION AND ADMINISTRATION.

The growth of the University leads me to recommend that the University Statutes touching organization and administration be amended in the following particulars:

Amend sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 7 so that they will read as follows:

- 1. All persons who give instruction in any department of the University, shall constitute the General Faculty.
- 2. The members of the General Faculty shall be classified as follows:
 (a) The President: (b) The Vice President and Dean of the Graduate School;
 (c) The Dean of Undergraduates and Assistant to the President; (d) The Deans of the separate colleges; (e) the Dean of the Woman's Department (f) Professors; (g) Associate Professors; (h) Assistant Professors; (i) Instructors
- 3. The President, the Vice President and Dean of the Graduate School, the Dean of Undergraduates and Assistant to the President, the Deans of the separate colleges, and Dean of the Woman's Department shall constitute the Council of Administration.
- 4. The President, the Deans, and the Professors or ranking heads of departments, shall constitute the University Senate.
- 5. The members of the General Faculty associated with each college or school shall constitute the Faculty thereof.
- 7. The Vice President shall exercise the functions of the President in his absence, and shall at all times have particular oversight of the Graduate School.

Add this section to become Section 8 and renumber the following sections.

8. The Dean of Undergraduates and Assistant to the President shall con-

8. The Dean of Undergraduates and Assistant to the President shall concern himself about the interests of individual students, shall see that the courses of undergraduate instruction are as well correlated as practicable and shall render such assistance to the President as that officer may desire.

Amend Section 11 by striking out the words "General Faculty" and inserting in place thereof the words "University Senate," and change terms in other sections to correspond.

SCHOOL OF COMMERCE.

Professor Kinley, who is now absent in Europe on leave, has expressed to me the desire that the School of Commerce, for which an appropriation of \$6,000.00 per year was made by the last Legislature, be not opened until September, 1902. It seems to me that the year is needed to complete plans and secure suitable teachers for the same, and that it will be quite as well to have the fund accumulate so that a portion of it may be used in the purchase of needed books, and I therefore concur in the recommendation.

The report of the Committee on Instruction, as amended was then adopted on motion of Mrs. Carriel, appointments and appropriations being made as therein recommended.

President Draper presented the resignation of Mr. N. S. Spencer, Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds, and it was accepted to take effect September 1, 1901.

President Draper also presented a communication from the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds with reference to repairs needed and the employés of his department. This was referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds, with power to act.

A communication was received from the "Board in Control of Athletics" asking for an appropriation for the improvement of Illinois Field and for the building of a grand stand thereon.

Fifteen hundred dollars was appropriated to extend the fence about Illinois Field and to improve the ball diamond.

The salary of W. L. Pillsbury as Secretary and Registrar was made \$2,350.00 a year.

President Draper presented a communication from Major Fechét, Professor of Military Science, asking that from Sept. 1, 1901, during the remainder of his detail, he be allowed \$48.00 a month as "commutation of quarters."

It was voted that the request be complied with.

A petition from the Urbana and Champaign Railway, Gas & Electric Company, asking permission to lay a gas pipe across the University grounds was referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds with power to act.

A petition from the same company asking the Board to authorize the proper officers to sign a petition to the City Council of Urbana for a renewal of its franchise for 20 years was referred to the same Committee.

Professor Palmer was allowed \$300.00 for work in water analysis during the coming summer vacation.

A communication was received from Professor Moss with reference to funeral processions, and it was ordered that hereafter no such procession be allowed to pass through any part of the University grounds.

CHEMICAL LABORATORY.

The Committee on Buildings and Grounds presented the following report:

URBANA, ILL., June 11, 1901.

To the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois.

Gentlemen: Your Committee on Buildings and Grounds desires to report in regard to the method of procedure in the erection of the new chemical laboratory.

We realize that the chemical laboratory is one of the most important buildings of our University group. It is important in that for a time it becomes the workshop of an unusually large per cent of the students who attend the University; and, in the increase of attendance, the growth is felt in the chemical department more perceptibly, perhaps, than in any other. Its importance is noted also in that the building must be specially adapted to laboratory purposes; the laboratories and lecture rooms, offices, studies, and investigation rooms being proportioned to the number of students taking instruction in the courses; and it being impossible to put the several rooms to other uses after they have once been fitted up.

Your Committee recommends—

- 1. That the building be generally planned after the shape of the letter E. the laboratories bring in the two outer extensions, and, because of this easily admitting enlargement without great expense.
- 2. That the building be erected of brick and trimmed with stone, the outer wall of the water table being stone.
- 3. That the building be three stories high, including the basement, which shall have its floor above the ground outside.
- 4. That the laboratories be separated from other parts of the building by fire-proof doors arranged to close automatically in case of heat.
- 5. That the building be erected generally in slow burning construction using the best means to reduce the possibility of great loss in the case of fire.
- 6. That the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds be requested to furnish the plans and conduct the construction of the building, if satisfactory terms can be agreed upon with him by the Committee.
- 7. That the architect, under the direction of your Committee, and in consultation with the President of the University and the professors in the chemical department, prepare preliminary plans and estimates as early as possible for the approval of the Board.

8. That contracts be let for the building as soon thereafter as practicable, and that the work be carried forward with the purpose of having the building ready for classes by Sept. 1, 1902.

Your Committee realizes that, with the money appropriated for building this laboratory, the closest economy will be necessary in order to construct a suitable building within the appropriation, and recommends that, while highly appreciating architectural beauty, adornment be used sparingly and that utility and durability be the motto throughout the design and construction of the building.

- 3. That changes be made in the kitchen and lunch room according to specifications.
- 4. That appropriations be made of \$50.00 for the first and second items and \$150.00 for the third.

I also transmit the annual statement of the Executive Faculty of the College of Medicine touching appropriations and salaries for the coming year. Notwithstanding every effort to procure this at an earlier time, it has only just come to hand. There has not been time for its careful examination, but it very clearly needs some modifications before being ready for the action of Board. It is therefore recommended that the expenditure of the college be allowed to proceed on the same basis as last year until the next meeting of the Board, and that in the meantime the statements be referred to the Committee on Finance and the Business Manager for investigation, conference with the officers of the college and report to the Board.

Both of the foregoing recommendations were adopted.

Instruction: Apparatus.

I submit the following recommendations:

- That the salary of Professor Dodge be \$2,200 per annum.
- That Gerdt Adolph Gerdtzen be appointed Assistant Professor of Machine Design in the department of mechanical engineering at \$1,600 a year.
- That instructors be appointed as follows for ten months at the monthly pay indicated:

In mechanical engineering, David Carroll Veirs, at \$75. In chemistry, Azariah T. Lincoln, at \$85.

In the Preparatory School, Cline F. Davidson, at \$80.

- 4. That David L. Scroggins be appointed Mechanician in Machine Shop, at \$70 per month for ten months.
- 5. That Wilber John Fraser, Instructor in Dairy Husbandry, be paid \$700 from the College fund, \$300 from the U.S. Station fund, and \$600 from the State Station fund.
- 6. That the salary of Archibald Dixon Shamel, Instructor in Farm Crops, be \$1,600, of which \$700 shall be paid from the College fund, and \$900 from the State Station fund.
- 7. That the salary of Willard John Kennedy, Instructor in Animal Husbandry, be \$1,600, of which \$700 be paid from the College fund, and \$900 from the State Station fund.
 - 8. That the salary of Oscar Erf, Instructor in Dairy Husbandry be \$1,400.
- 9. That J. H. Pettit be appointed Assistant in Chemistry in the Agricultural Experiment Station at \$1,000 a year to be paid from the State Station fund.
- 10. There is some reason to believe that Mr. A. B. Steubenrauch, appointed Assistant in Horticulture at the last meeting, may not accept, and no suitable candidate has been found for the position in soil physics. It is recommended that the President be empowered to arrange terms and fill one or both of these positions as may be necessary.
- 11. The resignation of William Esty, Jr., as Associate Professor of Electrical Engineering, is transmitted, with the recommendation that it be accepted to take effect September 1st.
- 12. That the sum of \$500 be paid to Judge O. A. Harker for services in the College of Law in the coming year, as heretofore.
- 13. That the sum of \$500 be appropriated for incidental expenses and apparatus in the two departments of chemistry.
- 14. That the sum of \$1,000 be appropriated for apparatus in the department of physiology.
- 15. That Albert Leroy Marsh be reappointed assistant in chemistry on the Water Survey at \$50 per month for 12 months.
- 16. That R. S. Woodrow, of Lincoln, Illinois, be appointed field assistant in sugar beet experiments at \$1,000 for eight months service, to be paid in 12 monthly installments, upon the understanding that he will spend the other four months in work as a student in the College of Agriculture.
- 17. That authority be given the President to engage on the best terms possible Mr. Coates P. Bull, of Minnesota, as Instructor in Farm Crops at a salary not to exceed \$1,500. This is for the purpose of enabling Mr. Shamel to take up the experimental work on corn provided for by the recent State appropriation.
- 18. It is recommended that in case of men who serve the Experiment Station under its new conditions, and whose duties begin on July 1st, that the advance in salaries begin with July 1st.
- 19. That the sum of \$800 be appropriated for the purchase of equipment for a bacteriological laboratory to be established by Professor Burrill and for the present to be located in the Agricultural Buildings.
- 20. That authority be given Professor Burrill to engage a stenographer and typewriter in his office at a salary of \$40 per month for 12 months, upon the understanding that the salary shall be borne in equal parts by the University general fund and the agriculture funds.

The foregoing recommendations Nos. 1 to 20, inclusive, were adopted.

21. I transmit the following joint recommendations of the Dean of the College of Agriculture and Director of the Experiment Station and the several committees representing the different State societies named in the bill appro-

priating funds for experimentation in agricultural lines touching the classes of experiments to be entered upon as provided in said bill, and advise that the several recommendations be approved by the Board.

President A. S. Draper:

DEAR SIR—The following recommendations are the result of a most careful and harmonious conference between the Director and other Station workers upon the one hand and the various committees mentioned in "Bill 315" upon the other and, with estimate for appropriations, they are respectfully presented for consideration of the Board of Trustees.

AGRICULTURAL EXPERIMENTS PROPOSED.

A. Under the "Live Stock Section."

- 1. That the committee appointed by the Illinois Live Stock Breeders' Association under the provisions of "Bill 315" be known as the University Live Stock Advisory Committee.
- 2. That for the present a minimum amount should go into buildings and every available dollar be used for experiments.
- 3. That at present experiments in cattle feeding at the University should be so far as possible in car load lots, fed in yards with cheap but substantial shelter sheds, in order to approximate the conditions of the actual feeder.
- 4. That the questions most useful to try to settle at present are: (a) Relative of different foods, especially those that are grown upon the farms, as clover compared with timothy hay. (b) The use of gluten meal with corn. (c) The relation between the amount of feed and economy of gain. (d) The influence of age upon the quantity and quality of gain. These cannot all be conducted at once at the University, but information should be sought along these lines.
- 5. That efforts be made to cooperate somewhat extensively with leading feeders by inducing them to undertake each a single experiment under such surroundings as he may have; the University to plan the experiment and assist in taking records.
- 6. That these should be combined steer and pig feeding experiments and that something should be done in a small way with questions of horse and sheep feeding.
- 7. That systematic efforts be made to collect reliable information as to methods of feeding in actual use in localities and countries that compete with Illinois in the world's markets.
- 8. That somewhat later a small herd of "scrub" cows and their calves be purchased—such as are in common use for the purpose—the calves fed off against an equal number of the best pure bred calves. That the cows be bred to a pure bred sire and the half blood steers be fed off, again in comparison with pure bred ones. That the grade heifers be bred to pure bred sires, their male progeny fed off and the females kept for further "grading up"—all to ascertain the exact comparative value of the scrub, the grade, and the pure bred, and the number of generations before the grade will approximate the pure bred animal.
- 9. That the returns of the earlier feeding experiments be utilized to erect a plain but suitable barn for more exact feeding experiments.
- 10. That typical specimens representing standard classes and breeds of live stock be secured, some by purchase and others by loan, and maintained in good condition for class work.

B. Under the "Corn Section":

1. That experiments be conducted both at the University and in coöperation with corn growers in different sections of the State.

- 2. That experiments in breeding corn for improvement in its chemical composition and physical characteristics should be continued and extended.
- 3. That the subject of corn judging should be further developed and score cards for the standard varieties established.
- 4. That efforts be made to determine the vitality and germinating power of the seed corn commonly planted by farmers of the State; also that information be distributed relative to methods of testing seed corn, and for its preservation.
- 5. That experiments be conducted to improve the methods of corn cultivation.
- 6. That the adaptations of standard varieties to the different sections of the State be investigated.
- 7. That investigations be made of the methods of storing and marketing of corn.
- 8. That experiments be conducted as soon as possible to determine the relative feeding value of corn of high and low protein content and of high and low oil content.

C. Under the "Soil Section":

- 1. In order to determine the immediate needs of the soil it was agreed that plat experiments should be conducted in about 15 or 20 localities in different sections of the State on different classes of soils which are typical of large areas of land. These plat experiments should include applications of the different elements of plant food and different methods of soil treatment, in order to discover whether the soil is deficient in the available supply of essential elements of fertility, whether its physical condition may be improved and its productive capacity increased.
- 2. Analyses should be made of the various typical soils throughout the State (beginning with those which represent the largest areas) to determine the total quantities of the several elements of plant food in the soils and the conditions in which it exists, both in virgin soils and in the long cropped and worn soils of the same type, in order to ascertain the effects of past and present systems of farming upon the stock of soil fertility and to furnish information as to the systems of farming which should be adopted for the various types of soil so that fertility may be utilized and conserved.
- 3. Investigations should be made of various soils of the State which are representative of large areas and which present special difficulties; as, for example, the "sealds," the so-called "dead dog," "bogus" or "alkali" lands, etc.
- 4. It was agreed that the Experiment Station should invite the coöperation of the Division of Soils of the United States Department of Agriculture in beginning a soil survey of the State.

The committee voted to recommend to the Trustees of the University of Illinois that they employ some competent person whose duties should include frequent reports to the press of the State regarding the work of the Agricultural College and the progress of agricultural experiments and investigations.

D. Under the "Horticultural Section":

- 1. The publication before August first a bulletin upon the picking, packing, and marketing of apples and pears.
- 2. The publication at an early date of a bulletin upon the picking, packing, and marketing of small fruits.
- 3. Experiments with cool and cold storage of fruits in cellars and cold storage possibly to the extent of \$1,300.00 and \$1,600.00 respectively.
 - 4. Investigation of bitter rot and other diseases to the extent of \$2,400.00.
 - 5. That \$1,500.00 be set aside for traveling and incidental expenses.

- 6. That experiments in cover crops be conducted.
- 7. That experiments in spraying be conducted as deemed wise by the Station.
- 8. That the committee should meet at the call of the Director, but that more than one meeting a year is likely desirable.
 - E. Under the "Dairy Section":

It was decided that the greater part of the energy should be devoted to field work over the State; that a careful study should be made of the dairy conditions as they exist with a view of correcting wrong practices, and helping in every possible manner to improve dairy conditions. It was suggested that a greater portion of this work had best be carried on in the dairy district of northern Illinois.

Experiments to be conducted at the University, so far as funds will permit, were agreed upon as follows, and were thought to rank in importance in the order named.

Dairy Cattle.

- 1. Ridding cows of flies.
- 2. Determining upon how small a quantity of milk calves can be successfully reared, and the best substitutes for milk as food for calves.
- 3. Immediate and continued effect of different quantities of the same feeds upon milk production.
- 4. Wide vs. narrow rations for dairy cows, and the ration most enconomical for Illinois.

Creamery.

- 1. Determine why some cream will whip while other cream containing the same per cent of butter fat will not.
 - 2. Determine most effective insulation for creamery refrigerators.
 - 3. Experiments on moulds in refrigerators.
- 4. Determine the species of bacteria that cause butter to deteriorate most rapidly at low temperature.
 - 5. Experiments in making butter from cream which has been frozen.
 - F. Under the "Sugar Beet Section":
- 1. That the work should be in charge of an experienced man thoroughly posted on the sugar beet and its methods of cultivation.
- 2. That the coöperation of a number of representative farmers should be enlisted on whose farms beets are grown.
- 3. That a happy feature incident to such a line of coöperative experiments would be the progressive ideas encouraged in the farmer and the cordial relations that would develop between the farmers and the Station.
- 4. The experiments conducted and the data collected should have reference to the variety of beets grown, the methods of fitting the ground, cultivation, time of planting and harvesting, and the tonnage and quality of crop. Regard should also be had to the precipitation and temperature.

Specific lines of investigation suggested are:

- 1. Crop rotation with sugar beets, which crops should precede and which should follow beets.
- 2. Preparation of soil and methods and time of planting and cultivation of beets.
- 3. Investigation to determine the types of soil best adapted to sugar beets and value of manure and fertilizers.

- 4. Testing standard varieties of beets and experiments with the breeding of beets to improve the quality.
- 5. Studies in the cost of production with the special view of increasing the use and efficiency of machinery and reducing the expense of beet growing.
- 6. Investigation of insect and fungous enemies and methods of preventing injuries.
- 7. Experiments to determine the feeding and fertilizing value of beet tops and of by-products from beet sugar factories.

Appropriations

To carry out the provisions of the act and the recommendations herein contained and to defray such general expenses as will naturally arise in the way of travel, administration, publications salaries, etc., it is requested that the sums contained in the bill be made available for their several purposes by appropriation as follows:

For live stock feeding experiments	\$ 8,000	00
For purchase and maintenance of live stock specimens	8,000	00
For experiments in corn and its cultivation		
For soil investigations		
For horticultural investigations		
For dairy investigations		
For sugar beet investigations	. 3,000	00

Should the total fund not be available to the University on July 1, then the estimates should be reduced pro rata.

All of which is respectfully presented.

The recommendations were adopted.

SQUIRRELS ON THE CAMPUS.

22. For some years I have had in mind the domestication of squirrels upon the grounds of the University and have made some investigations which lead me to believe that the suggestion is entirely practicable. Conferences with Professor Charles W. Rolfe have led him to ascertain where the animals can be found, and to look into the methods for housing and retaining them. The expense of such an undertaking is uncertain, but would easily be within \$250. To many such a movement at such a cost would seem chimerical. It does not seem so to me. If successful, the influence upon University life, and upon the feelings of students, would be considerable, and students would carry that influence to all parts of the State. I therefore recommend that Professor Rolfe be asked to initiate and supervise the enterprise, and that \$250 or so much as may be necessary be appropriated to meet the expenses.

The recommendation was adopted.

UNIVERSITY SENATE.

I recommend the following amendments to the University Statutes: Add to Section 4 concerning the University Senate the following:

The term "department" as here used shall mean such subdivision of the University organization as is marked by an individuality of its own, in the head of which there is centered some measure of administrative authority and responsibility. For the present the Colleges of Law and Medicine, the School of Library Science, School of Music, and the School of Pharmacy shall

each be represented by the Dean, ranking professor, or Director thereof. The other University departments to be represented by the head of each shall be as follows: Agronomy, Animal Husbandry, Architecture, Art and Design, Botany and Horticulture, Chemistry, Applied Chemistry, Civil Engineering, Economics, Education, Electrical Engineering, English Language and Literature, Geology, German, Greek, History, Horticulture, Househeld Science, Latin, Mathematics and Astronomy, Mechanical and Railway Engineering, Military Science and Tactics, Municipal and Sanitary Engineering and Theoretical and Applied Mechanics, Philosophy, Physical Training, Physics, Physiology, Rhetoric, Romanic Languages, Veterinary Science, Zoölogy.

CARE OF THE BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS.

I also recommend that all under the heads of "Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds" and "Heat, Light and Power Plant" on pages 26, 27 and 28 of the edition 1900 be stricken out and the following inserted:

After Sept. 1, 1901, the buildings and grounds of the University shall be in the immediate charge of three superintendents, viz., (a) a Superintendent of Buildings, (b) a Superintendent of Grounds, and (c) a Superintendent of the Central Heat, Light, and Power Station and the Water Station. These officers shall be appointed by the Board of Trustees, upon the recommendation of the President of the University, shall observe the general requirements of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds, and in the absence of such Committee shall be under the direction of the President of the University. They shall appoint such assistants, janitors, watchmen, and other employés in their respective departments as are authorized by the Trustees, and may also employ temporary workmen as may be needed, with the approval of the President and Business Manager of the University. They are enjoined to disregard all influences exerted in behalf of individuals and to make appointments solely upon the basis of merit and fitness. They will endeavor to retain competent and loyal employés indefinitely by assuring them permanency of position and giving them such confidence and recommending such rewards for them as may seem practicable. They shall suspend employés in their respective departments from employment when no longer needed, or at any time for cause, but shall report such action to the Chairman of the Board of Trustees. They shall be severally responsible for the physical condition and the efficiency of such parts of the University plant as are under their charge.

The professors of architecture, mechanical engineering, electrical engineering, sanitary engineering, horticulture, etc., shall, as a part of their regular employment, stand in an advisory relation to the superintendents aforesaid touching such parts of the plant as are in character related to the work of their departments; they shall possess themselves of full information touching the details of such parts, shall at all times be free to recommend changes and improvements therein, and any unusual changes therein shall be made with their approval or they shall forthwith report the fact to the President in writing.

The amendment was adopted.

The following resolution offered by Mr. McKay was adopted:

Resolved, that in all matters coming before the Board of Trustees involving the payment and disbursement of moneys such subject matter be referred to the Finance Committee for its consideration and report: Provided, however, that such matters may be considered without reference by unanimous consent of the Board, and that this be the standing rule of the Board.

PAROLE OF CHARLES W. SPALDING.

Under date of July 3, 1901, Charles S. Deneen, State's Attorney for Cook county, wrote the President and some other members of the Board as follows:

DEAR SIR—Application for parole of Charles W. Spalding, now serving sentence in the Joliet penitentiary upon a conviction of embezzlement of the funds of the State University, will be presented at the next meeting of the Board of Pardons to be held on the second Tuesday of this month. I have been requested to make some recommendation in view of the fact that he has now been incarcerated over four years and over three years of that time in the penitentiary, but I am reluctant to make any recommendation in which I am not joined by the persons most deeply interested in the result of his peculations. As the funds thus dissipated belonged to the State University, I have to request you as an officer of that institution to at once write to me your views as to whether I should recommend to the Board of Pardons favorable action upon his application for parole. Please give me an immediate reply.

In response to this communication the Board adopted the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois is opposed to granting either parole or pardon to Charles W. Spalding.

The Secretary was directed to transmit a copy of this resolution to State's Attorney Deneen.

REPORTS OF FEES, ETC.

Upon the suggestion of the Secretary paragraph 12 on page 21, of the Statutes of the University, edition of 1900, was amended to read as follows:

12. The Registrar shall report in detail to the Board at each regular meeting after the close of a semester or a term of the University, the number of students, who, during said semester or term, were indebted to the University for term fees, tuition, deposits, and all other financial obligations (with the amounts of each) imposed by their attendance upon the University.

The Committee on Publication recommended the approval of an agreement with the Champaign County Printing Co. to print the report of the chemical survey of water supply, and the recommendation was adopted.

SUPERINTENDENTS.

President Draper made the following recommendation:

URBANA, ILL., July 6, 1901.

To the Board of Irustees of the University of Illinois:

I hereby recommend the following appointments to take effect Sept. 1, 1901: Superintendent of Buildings, F. L. Peterson, at \$1,200.00 per annum.

Superintendent of Grounds, Fred Atkinson, at \$1,000 per annum.

Superintendent of Heating, Lighting and Power Station and Water Station, Joseph Morrow, at \$1,200 per annum.

A. S. DRAPER, President.

The Board appointed Messrs. Atkinson and Morrow and referred the appointment of a superintendent of buildings to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds.

JANITORS. HELP. WATCHMEN.

President Draper transmitted, with his approval, the following recommendations with regard to janitorships, etc. from the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds:

CHAMPAIGN, ILL., July 8, 1901.

President A. S. Draper:

DEAR SIR—Responding to your request, I advise you that, in my judgment, it will be necessary to provide for at least the following employés:

JANITORS.

One man at University Hall at \$40 per month.

One man at Agricultural Buildings at \$32 per month. One man at Engineering Hall at \$40 per month.

One man at the Armory at \$40 per month.

One man at the Armory at \$40 per month.

One man at Electrical Laboratory at \$32 per month.

One man at Chemical Laboratory at \$32 per month.

One man at Mechanical Engineering Shops at \$32 per month.

One man at Testing and Hydraulic Laboratories at \$32 per month.

Two men at New Gymnasium at \$32 per month.

Three women at \$1 each per working day. One student, part time, at Astronomical Observatory at \$15 per month.

One student, part time, at Library building at \$15 per month.

HEAT, LIGHT AND POWER AND WATER STATIONS.

From six to ten men, according to the time of year, will be needed in connection with the Heat, Light and Power Station. They are paid by the hour, according to the character of the work.

GROUNDS.

In addition to the gardener and assistant, through the greater part of the year, two workmen are needed. At certain times a considerable number of workmen is imperative, and there should be authority to employ them as needed.

WATCHMEN.

A day watchman, at \$50 per month, and a night watchman, at \$40 per month, are employed, and should be continued.

The sum of \$1,000 should be appropriated, out of which extra labor can be paid for as may become necessary.

The recommendations were adopted.

SCHOOL OF PHARMACY.

President Draper offered recommendations regarding a report presented by the Committee on Pharmacy at the meeting of June 11th, and on motion of Mrs. Abbott, action upon such of these recommendations as related to the reorganization of the School and to the establishment of an evening school was deferred to the September meeting of the Board; and the following recommendation with regard to appointments and salaries for the ensuing year was adopted: It is recommended that the Faculty of the School of Pharmacy be reappointed; that the guaranteed salaries be the same as last year, \$3,000; that Dr. Rodgers be paid \$100 and that the remaining \$2,900 be divided as follows, viz.: Professor Hallberg one-third or \$966.66, and Professor Puckner the same, Professor Goodman two-ninths or \$644.44, and Professor Day one-ninth or \$322.22, and that each teacher pay his assistant if he has one; and if there should be an excess of receipts over expenses on this basis it be divided in the same proportion, excluding Dr. Rodgers, up to the sum of \$1,500, beyond which sum the Faculty shall in no event have any claim.

Uniforms for the Battalion.

The Finance Committee made the following report which was adopted:

URBANA, ILL., July 6, 1901.

To the Board of Trustees.

The Committee on Finance respectfully reports on the matter of uniforms referred to it at the March meeting and recommends that the Business Manager be authorized to renew the present contract for one year.

The Committee on the College of Medicine was directed to inquire into the matter of the fire on the premises of the College.

The Board then took a recess to 2:30 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION, JULY 6, 1901.

When the Board met after the recess the same members were present as at the morning session.

SCHOLARSHIPS IN THE COLLEGE OF AGRICULTURE.

URBANA, July 6, 1901.

To the Board of Irustees of the University of Illinois:

Your Agriculture Committee and the President beg leave to report regarding scholarships in the College of Agriculture as follows:

- 1. That the special scholarships in the College of Agriculture be continued—one for each county (except Cook and Lake) and one each for the first ten congressional districts.
- 2. That appointments to these scholarships be made by the Trustees as heretofore upon recommendation of the Illinois Farmers' Institute.
- 3. That scholarships in Household Science (College of Agriculture) be established—one for each county (except Cook and Lake) and one each for the first ten congressional districts.
- 4. That appointments to scholarships in Household Science be made by the Trustees upon recommendation by the respective county domestic science associations organized in in connection with farmers' institutes.
- 5. That counties and districts not represented by domestic science associations organized in connection with their farmers' institutes shall not be entitled to representation; but in case there should be more than one acceptable candidate from a given county that is so represented such excess may be assigned to counties not represented by organized associations.

- 6. That institutes and associations are earnestly requested to make diligent inquiry as to scholarship, character, and energy on the part of candidates; it is suggested that a competitive examination in such elementary subjects as English Composition, Botany, and Algebra to and including Quadratic Equations be held, to the end that the appointment may be considered an honor at home and the appointee may become a credit to the University.
- 7. That while appointments should not be based upon considerations of scholarship alone, yet, other things being equal, those of highest scholarship should be preferred, and in all cases a high degree of ability to take instruction and to acquire learning should be insisted upon.
- 8. That candidates must be at least 18 years of age in order to be eligible to appointment.
- 9. That the purpose of these scholarships, like that of the full course of study in the College, is twofold: To afford opportunity for technical work in agriculture and in household science and also to encourage higher scholarship in related sciences and along academic lines.
- 10. That, therefore, in the assignment of work to scholarship students the same general relation should be observed between technical, scientific, and academic work as is observed with students pursuing courses leading to graduation.
- 11. That, also, while high scholarship is not made a requisite for admission, yet the authorities of the University will make diligent inquiry as to the scholastic attainments of each scholarship student, and while consulting individual preferences as far as consistent, will however, assign to students such work in amount and character as they are able to carry with profit to themselves.
- 12. That all assignments made in the College of Agriculture shall be without tuition or fee of any kind except laboratory fees in certain subjects, and that all assignments in the Preparatory School shall be with a tuition fee of two dollars per subject per semester.
- 13. That, if, upon interview, it shall appear that the training in English of any scholarship student is deficient, that student shall be assigned to the Preparatory School, to make such deficiency good without unnecessary delay.
- 14. That the scholarship continue for two years and that the holders be advised that two years time will not suffice to complete University courses, and be urged to do work which will satisfy entrance requirements and then take up regular work leading to a degree and that in case the holder of the scholarship shall meet the entrance requirements within the two years the benefits of the scholarship be extended two years further.
- 15. That farmers' institutes and domestic science associations be requested to make no recommendation for agricultural or household science scholarships unless candidates, with the concurrence of their parents, express their purpose to enter the University at the opening of a semester and remain to its close.
- 16. That no person who has been a student in the University shall be eligible to one of these scholarships.

NATURE STUDY IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

The Committee on Agriculture made the following report, which was adopted:

URBANA, ILL., July 6, 1901.

To the Board of Irustees of the University of Illinois:

Your Committee on Agriculture respectfully reports in regard to the request for nature study pamplets and extension courses, presented through the Secretary of the State Teachers' Association, the following statement from the Director of the State Laboratory of Natural History, and recommends that the preliminary work be undertaken as soon as practical, and that the Secretary of the Board send a copy of this report the Secretary of the Illinois State Teachers' Association.

The State Laboratory of Natural History engaged under State law in a biological survey of the State is about to begin the publication of a series of educational bulletins with a view to the application of the results of this State survey to purposes of public school instruction. It is also required by law to distribute to public schools sets of specimens illustrating the natural history of the State in condition for use as the material for instruction. It has lately transferred its thoroughly equipped biographical station to Ottawa, Illinois, and established in it a conveniently accessible and excellent location for biological field work, and proposes to open this station during the summer vacations to those wishing the opportunity for practical field experience and instruction in zoölogy, botany, geology, and physiography. To this work courses in elementary nature study can be added if desired. It seems to your Committee that the extension and development of this work the State Laboratory already organized in this field will meet the rational demands of the schools in a practical and sufficient manner, and we recommend to the State Teachers' Association that this organization be made their agency for the accomplishment of the purposes expressed in their resolution. To this end it will only be necessary that additional appropriations in support of the Laboratory be obtained for these specific purpose at the next session of the State Legislature.

MEETING OF SEPTEMBER 28, 1901.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois met in the Trustees' Room Library Building, Urbana, Illinois, at 9 o'clock a. m., Saturday, September 28, 1901.

The members present were Messrs. Bayliss, Bullard, Hatch, McKay, McLean, Nightingale, and Smith and Mrs. Carriel, Mrs. Abbott, and Mrs. Alexander; absent, Governor Yates and Mr. Conrad. President Draper was present.

The minutes of the regular meeting of June 11, 1901, and of the special meeting of July 6, 1901, were approved as presented by the Secretary.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM PRESIDENT DRAPER.

To the Board of Trustees.

The following changes and appointments in the instructional force are recommended:

1. That Herbert Windsor Mumford, heretofore professor of Agriculture at Michigan Agricultural College, be appointed Professor of Animal Husbandry and Chief in Animal Husbandry at the Agricultural Experiment Station, at a salary of \$2,200 to be charged as follows: \$900 to the College funds, \$300 to the United States Station funds, and \$1,000 to the live stock appropriation of the State Station funds.

This succession to the position and title of Dean Davenport in the Department of Animal Husbandry is upon that officer's suggestion. It is rec-

ommended, however, that his teaching continue with the position and title of Rrofessor of Principles of Variation and Selection in Domesticated Animals and Plants (Thremmatology).

- 2. That William Haw Knox be appointed Instructor in Soil Physics in the College of Agriculture and Chief Assistant in the Station at a salary of \$1,200 to be equally divided between the College funds and the appropriation concerning soils of the State Station funds.
- 3. That Coates Preston Bull be appointed Instructor in Farm Crops in the College and Assistant in Plant Breeding in the Station at \$1,200 a year, to be equally divided between the College funds and the United States Station funds.
- 4. That the title of Arnold Valentine Steubenrauch be Instructor, instead of Assistant, in Horticulture.
- 5. That Frederick Alexander Mitchell be appointed Instructor in Theoretical and Applied Mechanics at \$90 a month for ten months.
- 6. That Adam Vause Miller be appointed Assistant in General Engineering Drawing at \$50 a month for ten months in place of James Franklin Kable who has declined the position.
- 7. That Cline Flemming Davidson be appointed Instructor in the Preparatory School at \$80 a month for ten months.
- 8. That Marion Ballentyne White be appointed Instructor in the Department of Mathematics at \$75 a month for ten months.
- 9. That the terms of the appointment of Alvin Casey Beal be modified so that it be for twelve months, and that the salary of \$900 be paid in twelve installments.
- 10. That Frank William Scott appointed Fellow in English be appointed Instructor in Rhetoric for ten months at \$75 a month, and that his appointment as Fellow be rescinded.
- 11. That the title of Louis Liston Tallyn of the Department of Civil Engineering be that of Instructor rather than of Assistant in Civil Engineering.
- 12. That Benjamin Wetmer Brenneman be appointed Instructor in Voice Culture to commence October 1st, at \$800 for the remainder of the year, to be paid in nine installments, and that authority be given for the employment of his wife as Instructor in Sight Singing at \$500 for the same period, to be paid the same way.
- 13. That Fred Henry Rankin be appointed as Representative of the College of Agriculture in connection with the Farmer's Institutes; that he have charge of the correspondence relating thereto and arrange for the systematic attendance of members of the faculty at institutes, so far as may be practicable, and that he himself represent all the interests of the University at the institutes so far as he can; also that he encourage and conduct corresponence with the people of the State, touching the interest of scholarship in connection with the farm work of the State in the fullest measure possible; that his appoinment take effect October 1, 1901, and that the salary be \$1,500 a year, one half to be paid from the College funds and the other half from the State Station funds.
- 14. It is recommended that the foregoing appointments take effect as of September 1, 1901, unless otherwise specially provided. In practically every case authority for the appointment has heretofore been given me by the Board: and in all such cases, and in the case of Professor Mumford, the service commenced with the opening of the University year.
- 15. It is recommended that the compensation of the janitor at the Agricultural Buildings be \$40 a month instead of \$32 a month as fixed at the June meeting.
- 16. Mr. Fred Ladage has help for the last two years an agricultural scholarship which has expired. He has just returned to the University under the impression that he could matriculate and so have his scholarship extended. He is unable to matriculate, however, but can probably do so within the

present year. It is represented to me that his disappointment is great; that his circumstances are such as to claim any aid which the University can properly extend; and that he is an earnest and worthy student. In view of all this I recommend that the term of his scholarship be extended one year.

It will be observed that the attendance is somewhat increased over last year. This was due to the enlargement of the offerings and to more systematic advertising. Yet it is true that the attendance was not what the offerings and the labor warranted us in expecting. I am confident that the work of the term was very satisfactory to students. The cost to the University per student was large, and the tax upon the strength of teachers employed was severe. While I am not very confident of the wisdom of the expenditure of money and strength, for the purpose of obtaining the action of the Board of Trustees in the premises, I recommend that the term be continued next year, and that the sum of \$5,000, or so much of it as is necessary, be appropriated for the expenses thereof.

FEES IN SCHOOL OF MUSIC.

I transmit herewith a communication from the Director of the School of Music on behalf of the faculty thereof stating objections to the results of the action of the Board touching free tuition in music to matriculated students in so far as it seems to extend the privilege to students without musical preparation. It is more than doubtful if the Board intended that free instruction should be furnished in preparatory and elementary work in music any more than in academic lines of study. There have been established preparatory and collegiate departments in the School of Music. It is recommended that the division between these be fixed by the faculty at a point which assumes for the present two years of previous competent instruction and serious musical study; that the prescribed fees be charged all students in the preparatory department, and that tuition be free in the collegiate department to matriculated students, residents of Illinois, carrying regular work in the University.

AGRICULTURAL EXPERIMENT STATION.

The proposition of Dr. Quine to make a donation to the library of the College of Medicine was referred to the Committee on the College of Medicine with directions to investigate the same and report to the Board.

It being evident that the lowest bids exceeded the amount of the appropriation for the construction of the building, all were referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds and the architect for consideration and report at the afternoon session.

REORGANIZATION OF THE AGRICULTURAL EXPERIMENT STATION.

The special committee appointed with regard to the reorganization of the Agricultural Experiment Station submitted the following report which was adopted:

URBANA, ILL., Sept. 28, 1901.

To the Board of Trustees.

At the July meeting of the Board the undersigned were appointed a committee to formulate and report a plan for the organization of the Agricultural Experiment Station work.

We have heretofore had an Advisory Board composed of one representative from each of the State agricultural bodies, and the Trustees have been accustomed to follow the recommendations of this Board, unless in very exceptional cases. And this, although it was known that attendance of members of the Board was very irregular and that it was exceedingly difficult to secure a quorum.

At the last session of the Legislature new and, relatively, very large appropriations were made for special work at the Experiment Station. The act making these appropriations not only fixed the lines in which the moneys should be expended, but created an Advisory Committee upon each one of those lines, which should represent the State organizations directly interested therein. By operation of law, therefore, each of the State organizations heretofore represented upon the Advisory Board of the Station is much more completely represented than it has been heretofore, in the line of investigation in which it is most interested and upon which it is most competent to speak, with the exception of the State Board of Agriculture; and the representative from that Board has not been accustomed to attend the meetings of the Advisory Board, and moreover the State Board of Agriculture is by law directly represented in the Board of Trustees.

It seems obvious to your committee, therefore, that the continuance of the Advisory Board upon the Experiment Station is unnecessary and liable to lead to confusion; indeed, that is liable to stand in the way of that assumption of responsibility by the Board of Trustees concerning the management of the investigational work of the State which is specifically charged by the act making the appropriations therefor.

Your committee therefore recommends that the Advisory Board of the Experiment Station be discontinued; that the reasons therefor be made known to the members of that Board, and that the thanks of the Board of Trustees for assistance heretofore given be expressed to them.

It is also recommended that the following words be stricken out of the preamble to the Statutes of the Board of Trustees touching the transaction of University business; viz, "And that in the transaction of the business of the Experiment Station the action of the Advisory Board of the Station shall be accepted for that of the Board of Trustees of the University when within the scope of the delegated powers conferred upon the Advisory Board and pursuant to the appropriations made by the Board of Trustees. The Director of the Station shall be the executive officer thereof."

It is recommended that the mention of such Board be eliminated from the Statutes wherever it is made, and that the following paragraph be inserted in the Statutes:

"The Agricultural Experiment Station.

The immediate direction of the affairs of the Station will rest with the Director thereof. Recommendations of the several advisory committees provided by the Act of the General Assembly of Illinois, approved May 10, 1901, shall be immediately transmitted to the Board of Trustees for approval before being acted upon. All appointments of regular employés of the Station will be made by the Trustees upon the recommendation the Directors of the Station, approved by the President of the University, and all purchases of

material shall be made by the Business Manager upon the requision of the Director, approved by the President of the University. The Business Manager shall keep separate accounts of the different Experiment Station funds and shall account therefor as in the case of all University funds."

Resolved, That the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, desiring to voice their approval of the sentiments and opinions expressed by President Draper in this admirable address, request his consent to the publication and distribution of the same, and, after such consent is obtained, do hereby instruct the Secretary to have the same suitably published in pamplet form.

President Draper, Mr. Nightingale, and Mrs. Abbott were appointed a committee to draft and present to the Board, resolutions expressive of the feelings of the Board concerning the assassination of President McKinley.

Professor Palmer's bill of \$40.38 for expenses incurred in visiting the chemical laboratory of the University of Kansas was ordered paid.

TILING ON THE SOUTH FARM.

URBANA, ILL., Sept. 28, 1901.

To the Board of Irustees of the University of Illinois:

GENTLEMEN:—Your Committee to which was referred the drainage of the south farm submits the following report:

The outlet tile, so far as we were able to find them, where four or more inches in diameter, were in good order, and we think capable of carrying the water from the farm. All tile above catch basins are completely filled and useless.

The basins were made of brick and partly arched over and then covered with plank and stone. All were broken in at the top and filled with earth. All basins were covered with earth.

A diligent search was made for a plot of the drainage work at the Secretary's office, the Business Manager's office, the Superintendant's office, the civil engineer's office, and at the Agricultural Building, but nothing could be found relative to drainage on this farm.

Your Committee recommends that an engineer be employed to act with Mr. Hedges to locate plot and drains recently laid on the east eighty of said farm and place said plot on record with the Secretary, Further, that an engineer be employed to seek levels and locate catch basins on all lands lying north of a line running east and west by the farm house west of what is known as the Best forty. And that the engineer be instructed to run lines for drainage on this land and plot the same and place the record with the Secretary. The tile to be laid as soon as crops can be removed.

The expense of work already done, outside of the mileage and individual expenses of the chairman of the Committee, is \$7.00, which sum has not been paid.

Your committee can give no location of drains definitely as we employed no engineer but Mr. Hedges, and your chairman will be quite good authority if we should be consulted when these catch basins and outlets are sought for.

Your Committee recommends that the Committee on Agriculture be charged with superintendence of this work.

COAL CONTRACT.

The Committee of Buildings and Grounds made the following report with regard to letting the contract for coal for the ensuing year, and the report was adopted:

URBANA, ILL., Sept. 28, 1901.

To the Board of Trustees:

Your Committee on Buildings and grounds asks leave to report that a call was made by the Committee for bids on furnishing the University with coal for the year beginning September 1, 1901. The date for opening proposals was July 22, 1901, and the public advertisements were put into the papers about two weeks before. Notices were also sent out by mail to about thirty-five coal operators and dealers and to officials of the Illinois Central and Wabash railroads. The following is the notice:

PROPOSALS FOR COAL.

The Committee on Buildings and grounds of the University of Illinois will receive until 12 o'clock noon, July 22, 1901, sealed proposals for eight thousand tons, more or less, of best Illinois coal to be delivered on the cars at Urbana or Champaign, Illinois, for the University of Illinois. The coal will be of size known as pea coal, and shall be screened of all large lumps, dust and dirt. The coal will be delivered between September 1, 1901, and August 31, 1902, as needed by the University for heating, lighting and power purposes. Bids for a half or a third or two thirds of the whole, more or less, will be entertained. It is desired that such fractional proposals added together will equal the amount of coal wanted. In such case the contract will be made with the several companies. Quality, price and ability to fulfill the contract will be considered in awarding contracts.

The right is reserved to reject any and all proposals.

Appreciating the favorable competition which was obtained, the chairman of the Committee subsequently sent to each bidder the following letter:

Gentlemen:—The Committee on Buildings and Grounds of the University of Illinois on July 22 last, in response to advertisements and circular letters received the following sealed proposals for coal which were that day opened by the Committee.

Springside Coal Mining Company, Pana, Ill., via the Big Four railway, 4,000 tons of No. 2 nut coal at \$1.53 per ton. Or if delivered over the Illinois Central, five cents per ton higher. Or pea coal at \$1.35 per ton over Big Four railway.

New Kentucky Coal Company, Chicago, Ill., via Illinois Central, 8,000 tons of No. 2 washed nut coal (pea coal size) at \$1.95 per ton.

The Junction Mining Company, Springfield Junction, Ill., 8,000 tons of well screened pea coal at \$1.2912 per ton.

Moweaqua Coal Mining and Manufacturing Company, Moweaqua, Ill., via Illinois Central at Champaign or via Big Four railway at Urbana, 3,000 tons of No. 2 nut and pea coal mixed, at \$1.38 per ton.

Penwell Coal Mining Company, Pana, Ill., 3,000 tons of pea coal at \$1.55 per ton.

Barclay Coal and Mining Company, Springfield, Ill., pea coal to April 1, 1902. at \$1.55 per ton.

St. Louis and Big Muddy Coal Company, Carbondale, Ill., via Illinois Central, 2,500 tons of No. 3 washed pea coal at \$2.05 per ton.

The Warden Coal Washing Company, Chicago, Illinois, No. 3 washed coal at \$2.00 per ton.

The Riverton Coal Company, Chicago, Ill., via Wabash cars, 8,000 tons of "Riverton Pea Coal" at \$1.18 per ton.

Madison Coal Company and Mount Olive Coal Company, St. Louis via Illinois Central, pea coal at \$1.20 per ton. Or nut, pea, and slack mixed at \$1.10 per ton.

Bell and Zoller Coal Company, Chicago, Ill., via Illinois Central, 8,000 tons of pea coal at \$1.30 per ton.

O'Gara, King and Co., Chicago, Ill., via Illinois Central, 8,000 tons of peacoal at \$1.40 per net ton.

The contract was awarded to the Riverton Coal Company.

The Committee desires to thank the coal operators offering proposals for their courtesy in the matter and to assure them that in future contracts as in the past they will be treated fairly.

At the time coal bids were called for, bids for hauling the coal also were called for. July 22d only one bid was received, that from Renner & Brother, of Urbana, for 20 cents a ton if hauled from Urbana, or from Champaign at the Green street crossing of the Illinois Central Railroad. The contract was subsequently awarded to Renner & Brother for 20 cents, the haul to be made from Urbana, with the proviso that, if the University succeeded in getting the Wabash railroad to put in a switch between the stations of the two cities, then an adequate reduction be made equal to the saving of distance in hauling.

It is gratifying to know that during this year of rising prices along all lines the University has purchased its coal for the year two cents a ton lower than the last year and that hauling at no greater price than last year.

The Riverton Coal Company has furnished a good bond and entered into contract and the same have been filed with the Secretary of this Board.

RESOLUTION CONCERNING PRESIDENT M'KINLEY.

The special committee appointed at the morning session made the following report which was adopted:

Resolved, That the University of Illinois hereby places upon record this expression of its grief touching the recent sad death of President William McKinley by assassination, and its feeling of shame and apprehension as the fact is made apparent that it resulted from the influence upon a degenerate mind of the false teachings of a small class of agitators calling themselves revolutionary anarchists.

Resolved. That American citizenship, standing as it does for the largest freedom consistent with the moral sense of freemen moved by sound purposes in life, is not broad enough to cover a class devoid of such moral sense, opposed to all government, and inimical to the laws of society.

Resolved, That it is a gross perversion of the guarantees of free speech, handed down to us by the fathers and specifically assured by our governmental constitutions, to assume that they authorize the expression of sentiments abhorrent to reason and good morals and destructive of the sacred ends for which governments exist; and it is the desire of this Board that every influence of the University shall be exerted to make this clear to all the people, to the end that governmental action may ensue which shall hereafter prohibit and outlaw all such teachings.

Resolved, That we express our admiration for the great qualities of head and heart in President McKinley, which will endear him to his countrymen for all time; and that we cherish the hope that the frail wife, who was the constant object of his tender care, may be sustained by a beneficent Providence through this great affliction, and that the lessons of his life and death may be an abiding blessing to the coming generations of Americans and to all mankind.

Building and Grounds.

The Committee on Buildings and Grounds made the following report which was accepted for record.

URBANA, ILL., Sept. 28, 1901.

To the Board of Trustees:

Your Committee on Building and Grounds, to which was referred sundry matters, reports as follows:

- 1. In regard to the appointment of a Superintendent of Buildings. After consideration it was decided to appoint F. L. Petersen, as recommended by President Draper, at a salary of \$1,200.00 a year, his duties to commence September 1, 1901.
- 2. The Committee located the new Chemical Laboratory on the ground between the Agricultural Buildings and the present Chemical Laboratory, the building to front west the south line of the south wing being twenty feet north of the north line of California avenue extended. A stake was driven at the northwest corner.
- 3. The petition of the Urbana and Champaign Railway, Gas and Electric Company to lay a gas pipe across our campus from Wright street to Mathews avenue was granted, on a condition that it be laid in a locality which would not interfere with the use of the grounds by the University; and if it became necessary to remove the pipe at any time, the said company should remove it without expense to the University. The Superintendent of Build-

ings and Grounds was instructed to point out the location and to see that the pipe was laid therein and the campus put in good condition after the pipe was laid, all at no expense to the University.

- 4. The petition of the same company that the University sign a petition to the Urbana City Council for a renewal of the franchise of the said company for twenty years was acted upon favorably and President Smith was authorized to sign such petition.
- 5. Sundry repairs recommended by the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds in the several buildings were acted upon and the following ordered: A new red plain tile roof on the Armory building to take the place of the wood shingle roof; new floors in part of the corridors and rooms of University Hall; the damp walls of the basement of the Library Building to be furred and replastered so that the walls would not show dampness on the inside.

The ordinary work of repairing annually made necessary was also ordered.

6. At the meeting of the Committee held July 22d last the Committee received the following instruction from the Executive Committee:

URBANA, July 22, 1901.

The Executive Committee of the University hereby instructs and authorizes the Committee on Buildings and Grounds to have the heating and ventilation system in use in the Library Building put into good condition, and hereby appropriates \$600.00 therefor.

T. J. SMITH, ALEX. McLEAN, Executive Committee.

The Committee thereupon instructed the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds to attend to the matter and carry out the recommendations of Architects Ricker and White and Mr. Spencer, the cost not to exceed the appropriation.

The following resolution was adopted on motion of Mrs. Alexander, the vote standing: Yeas—Messrs. Bullard, Hatch, McKay, Nightingale, and Smith and Mrs. Abbott and Mrs. Alexander; nays—none; absent, Governor Yates and Messrs. Bayliss, Conrad, and McLean and Mrs. Carriel:

WHEREAS, Some doubt exists as to the legality of the proceedings had to pave Wright street in the City of Champaign, and

WHEREAS, Work has been well advanced in the construction of said pavement, and

WHEREAS, Some question has been raised as to the liability of the University of Illinois to pay the benefits assessed against the said University and its property, therefore

Resolved, By the Board of Trustees that it ratifies and confirms every step and action taken to pave said street, including the legal sufficiency of the petition, the action of the Board of Local Improvements, the passage of the ordinance by the said city to pave said street, and the action and judgment of the county court on said ordinance and petition to pave the said street, and also approves of the amount of the assessment of benefits to the University and its property; and, further

Resolved, That the Business Manager be, and he is hereby, directed to pay three installments of the assessment as soon as the said city certifies that the contractor has completed the work according to the plans and specifications, and the remainder as fast as the installments are due annually.

MEETING OF DECEMBER 10, 1901.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois met in the Trustees' Room, Library Building, Urbana, Ill., at 9:00 o'clock a.m., Tuesday, Dec. 10, 1901.

The members present were Messrs. Bayliss, Bullard, Hatch, Mc-Kay, McLean, Nightingale and Smith, and Mrs. Carriel, Mrs. Abbott and Mrs. Alexander; absent, Governor Yates and Mr. Conrad. President Draper was present.

The minutes of the regular meeting of Sept. 28, 1901, and of the special meeting of Oct. 26, 1901, were approved as presented by the Secretary.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM PRESIDENT DRAPER.

University of Illinois, Dec. 10, 1901.

To the Board of Trustees:

I have the honor of laying before the Board the following business:

- 1. In September last Mr. Albert Leroy Marsh, an assistant in the water survey, resigned and left us unexpectedly. Mr. Arthur Donaldson Emmett, a graduate of the class of 1901, was secured and has been at work since. I recommend that he be regularly appointed at \$60 a month for 12 months in the year.
- 2. The Dean of the College of Agriculture has in letters to me expressed himself in favor of a somewhat decided advance in the price of milk sold by the University. It has seemed to me of doubtful advisability to take this step, or at least to make so much of an advance as has been named. There is perhaps more to be said upon the subject pro and con than would at first appear. I would advise that the Committee on Agriculture be empowered to inquire into the whole matter and settle it.
- 3. The University has heretofore made appropriations for supplying blank books for regular University examinations, and that policy has been followed for the last two or three years. Yet there has been no continuing rule upon the subject, and the question as to what examinations books shall be supplied comes up frequently, and the question as to how the expenses shall be met comes up periodically. Hence I recommend the adoption of the following:

Resolved. That for the regular examinations at the end of each semester, for final examinations in courses continuing for less than a full semester, and for entrance examinations, the Business Manager shall furnish examination books. He shall give out such books upon the written request of the head of each University department, which request shall state the size and the exact number of books needed for each class in his department. Examination books for entrance examination shall be given out upon the request of the Registrar and the Principal of the Preparatory School. Books drawn and not used, if

any, shall be returned to the Business manager immediately after the examinations. The cost of the examination books shall be charged to the account of stationery and printing.

4. The increase in the number of students in the University regiment makes it necessary to apply to the War Department for the issuance of another hundred cadet rifles and sets of accourrements, and this makes it necessary for the Board to authorize the University to execute a bond to the Government of the United States for the care thereof. Accordingly I recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the University execute as principal, and deliver to the Government of the United States, a bond in the penal sum of three thousand five hundred seven dollars for additional ordnance and stores consisting of one hundred Springfield eadet rifles and sets of equipment, about to be issued to the University for the use of the military department by the Secretary of War, and that Mr. Thomas J. Smith, President of the Board of Trustees, be and is hereby authorized to sign said bond on behalf of the University, and attach thereto the seal of the University.

5. Meetings of educational associations and incidental gatherings for educational ends are occurring frequently. In my opinion the thing is being overdone, and the greater number of these assemblages are not of sufficient importance to the University to justify the expense of attendance or the absence of a University representative from regular work. Yet it is sometimes clear that we ought to be represented. But who is to determine at what gatherings we shall be represented, and when the University shall bear the expense of representation, and who the representative shall be? There is no rule on the subject, and for the purpose of securing one I recommend the following to your favorable consideration:

Resolved, That members of the University faculties should be disposed to attend, at least occasionally, and at their own expense, meetings of the National Educational Association and of the Illinois State Teachers' Association because of the obligation all teachers are under to sustain such associations, and that the same rule should apply to attendance by a member upon a meeting of teachers of his own class held for the promotion of the particular line of work in which he is engaged, because such attendance is in the interest of his own efficiency rather than of the University representation. Beyond this the President of the University is authorized to determine at what meetings it seems sufficiently desirable that the University shall be represented to justify the expense thereof; that he feel free to attend such meetings himself, if he thinks it desirable to do so; and if not, that he arrange for such representation as he thinks well, and that the expense thereof be a University charge.

In connection with the same subject I recommend the following:

Resolved, That the Board would approve the expense of a room for University headquarters in connection with the Illinois State Teachers' Association.

6. The last General Assembly made an appropriation of \$8,000, for remodeling the old Chemical Laboratory so as to make it available to the College of Law or the School of Music. Other plans are contingent upon the decision as between the College of Law and the School of Music, and steps should soon be taken in full preparation for completing the work in the next summer vacation.

It seems to me that the building and the surrounding conditions lend themselves to the needs of the Law School rather than to the Music School, and that the interests of the latter will be better met in the auditorium, which we must surely erect at an early day, than they could be in the old laboratory building. It is likely also that the School of Music would interfere less with other instructional work if so housed. The old building would make an admirable home for the College of Law.

I therefore recommend that, as soon as the chemistry departments can relinquish the use of the laboratory, it be remodeled for the College of Law,

and that the Superintendent of Buildings, in connection with the department of architecture, prepare plans and specifications and estimates for the work, having regard to the amount of the appropriation and the necessity of completing the work in the next summer vacation, and that the work proceed under the general direction of the Committee on Buildings and Grounds.

7. A communication from Dean Kinley to me, suggesting general plans touching the organization and work of the contemplated department of political science and industrial economics, has been forwarded to each member of the Board. This letter expresses my own views of the subject in a general way, for it was framed after a very full comparison and adjustment of ideas concerning the matter. Beyond this the University Senate has discussed the subject somewhat, and has voted that in its judgment the new work (a) should be carried in a department of the College of Literature and Arts; (b) should be undergraduate in character without precluding graduate instruction; and (c) that museum features as means of instruction should not be relied upon or specially developed.

If the Trustees have any suggestions or directions to give in the premises, either in modification or extension of the plans projected, it is desirable that, so far as practicable, they be now given, to the end that they may proceed in cordial coöperation. We have come to the time to search for the men who can inaugurate this work strongly, and it is well known that there are not many of them. It is quite possible that the characteristics of the men who may be available may in some measure modify the lines of work proposed. With the approval of the Board, I will proceed in the search, in coöperation with Dean Kinley, in the hope of being able to lay before you at the March meeting recommendations covering the work and the faculty of the new department.

- The rule of the Board touching leaves of absence for professors begins as follows: "A professor who has served seven consecutive years, and requests it, may be given a furlough for one year on half pay." It may be remembered that the wording of this rule was arrived at rather hastily, in the midst of a busy session of the Board. I have always supposed that the common thought was that these leaves of absence were not for relief from regular work, because the summer vacations would ordinarily seem ample for that, but in order to enable professors to pursue study abroad which could not be carried on in the summer time. Some members of the Faculty, at least, have understood it otherwise. It seems to me that the view I have expressed is the only one which can be safely upheld or allowed to become of general operation. If one desires more than this the case should be special and brought up outside of the general rule, and the special circumstances and purposes shown which will justify a departure from the rule. It also seems to me that we shall avoid misunderstandings if we call the privilege accorded a "leave of absence for the purpose of foreign study" rather than a "furlough." It also seems that the privilege may as well be extended to associate professors and assistant professors as to full professors. For the purpose of securing the action of the Board and settling these matters I recommend that the rule be amended so as to read as follows:
- "A professor, associate professor, or assistant professor, who has served seven consecutive years, and requests it, may be given a leave of absence for the purpose of foreign study for one year on half pay; provided, that these permits shall only be given on the advice of the President, and shall not be given so as to conflict with each other in any way, or to hamper the work of the University. Also, that a professor taking such leave of absence shall pledge himself to remain at the University for three years after his return, at the salary of his grade, and that the University in return shall agree to retain him in its service during his leave of absence and for one year thereafter."
- 9. A recent movement of the Urbana and Champaign Street Railway Company to lay new tracks and equip and operate an electric road over their old right of way running east and west between the Mechanical Engineering Wood Shops and the Metal Shops seems to me to claim the close attention of the Board of Trustees.

It is manifestly opposed to the interests of the University to have two trolley roads operated upon parallel lines across the busiest parts of its grounds and but a few rods apart. There are many different reasons for this which ought to be apparent to the railroad company, and in the light of recent events it would seem that the company ought to be very glad to respect them.

Some years ago the road applied for and received from the University the permission to lay and operate a line over our campus along Green street, upon the distinct understanding that it was a privilege to continue only at our sufferance, or as a tenant at will. It is not conceivable that this privilege would have been granted except upon the belief and implied understanding that so long as it continued the road would not operate the old line, and as a matter of fact the road has from that time till now made no use of the old line and the rails were taken up and the line abandoned.

Not long since the road applied to the University to use its influence in favor of an application for the extension of its franchise in the City of Urbana from the period of something like eleven years which it has yet to run to the term of twenty years from date, and definitely assured us that if we would do so, and the application should be successful the road would convey to the University the land upon which the road had formerly been operated between the University lands. The matter was submitted to the Board and approved, and the influence of the University was cordially and strongly exerted to the end desired. For some reason the application was not looked upon with favor by the Urbana city council, and failed. Since then the road has commenced to relay tracks upon the old line and has applied to me to have our walks on Burrill avenue changed to a grade which the company proposes to establish at that point.

This I not only refused to do, but have remonstrated against the company proceeding to rehabilitate the old line, and have asked that a general officer of the company, with authority to act for it, come and confer with the authorities of the University that conclusions might be reached which would not be antagonistic to the interests of either party. Responsive to this request President W. B. McKinley came to me yesterday for conference, and what was said justifies the hope that an acceptable agreement may be reached. Mr. McKinley agreed that work would be stopped at once, and assured me that he would be at home to-morrow to advise with any one acting on behalf of the Board of Trustees, and would endeavor to arrive at conclusions acceptable to the University.

We have been proceeding upon assumptions, which seemed justified, that the old line would not be operated again, and have very considerable interests which would suffer it it should be. It is likewise important to avoid a disagreement or a contest over the matter if we can. For some years our relations with the road have been agreeable, and we have done everything which we properly could to have them so. Aside from small matters which the officers of the University could do without the action of the Trustees, the Board has allowed the decided privilege of operating upon our land along Green street for years, and last year granted the request of the company to be allowed to lay down double tracks on Wright street, and also the request to lay a gas main through our lands south of the main buildings. It would seem that we are in a position to justify us in the expectation that we should receive from the company something more than the letter of our legal rights strictly entitles us to. In any event, it is clear that we shall either have to take up the matter first or last, or surrender very decided University interests and that an early and definite understanding as to whether we can agree or must disagree is made necessary by conditions which are now forced upon us.

It is likely that the University community is somewhat better accommodated by the road operating on Green street but that we should not be seriously inconvenienced if it were to be operated on the old line exclusively, and I am of the opinion that rather than permit both lines to be operated the interests of the University would call for action which would require the

road to withdraw from Green street. Still there need be little hesitancy in saying that the interests of the University would be still better subserved by an agreement which would permit the continuance of the road upon Green and the acquisition of such compensatory rights or privileges as would enable us to take the old railway line under our care and put it in condition to conform to the campus and contribute to the beauty rather than menace the attractiveness thereof.

- I am not without hope that this may be accomplished, and recommend that the whole matter be referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds with power to take what action it may think well in the premises, and with the injunction that it take early and decisive steps to protect and promote the University interests as best it can.
- 10. Touching the recommendations in the communication from the Dean of the College of Agriculture and Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station, I recommend:
- (a) That the decoration of Morrow Hall be authorized at an expense not to exceed \$300, to be paid from the fund for furnishing the Agricultural Buildings, provided there shall remain a sufficient amount after the payment of existing obligations, and not otherwise; and that the work proceed under the direction of Professor Wells, upon plans to be approved by me.
- (b) That Professor Hopkins be authorized, with the approval of the Business Manager, to dispose of a two-horse direct current motor.
- (c) The recommendation that the bill of \$839.65 for changes in rooms at the Agricultural Buildings and not duly authorized, be paid from the fund for "draining, fencing and repairs on the experimental farms" should, in my judgment be modified.

This bill has occasioned some annoyance. The Business Manager has very properly refused to pay it. Yet the University will have to pay it, because the University has appropriated the labor and materials to its own uses. The builder is not chargeable with knowledge that the work was not duly authorized. Dean Davenport assumes responsibility for having the work done without authority and says all that he could be expected to say concerning that phase of the matter. It is likely that the changes are desirable. It is probable that if they had been formally presented and freely considered they would have been authorized. I had only the slightest information in reference thereto, and that I gave to the Board at the June meeting when recommending an appropriation of \$800 for equipment of a bacteriological laboratory I said, verbally, that I was assured the rooms would be prepared at the expense of special agricultural funds. I have had no responsibility, and have taken no action in the premises. I know very well that there has been no intentional wrong in the matter. The difficulty has arisen out of the multiplication of operations and the confusion of procedure incident thereto in the affairs of the College of Agriculture.

I recommend that the bill be paid; but it would clearly be a diversion of the fund "for draining, fencing, and repairs on the experimental farm" to use it for this purpose. This fund has heretofore been, in some measure at least, used for purposes not intended by the legislative act; but it is all needed, and indeed is wholly insufficient, to do for the farms what their welfare and appearance imperatively demand. It seems to me that it would come as near the right as we are likely to succeed in doing if we charged half of this bill to the State Station fund and half to the funds of the Agricultural College, and I so recommend.

(d) That the estimates for the College of Agriculture and the Experiment Station for the quarter ending March 31, 1902 be approved as follows:

SCHOOL OF PHARMACY.

Fig. The following communication from the Advisory Board of the School of Pharmacy was presented by Mrs. Abbott and referred to the Committee on Instruction.

To the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois:

The Advisory Board of Pharmacists created for the purpose of keeping the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois in touch with the practitioners of pharmacy in the State and to offer suggestions relative to the School of Pharmacy in Chicago begs leave to submit the following:

Since the acquirement of the School of Pharmacy in 1896 there has been a slight increase in attendance at the School, but not so great as might have been expected nor required by the demand for pharmacists and assistants.

There has been, especially during the past two years, a notable scarcity of help although wages have increased nearly 50 per cent, the salaries for competent and thoroughly experienced pharmacists averaging \$75 a month while assistants with three or four years' experience easily secure employment at wages of from \$50 to \$60 a month. While several causes have operated to bring about this condition the attempt on the part of the School to require some standard for admission and also the requirements of the Pharmacy law for a preliminary education for registration as apprentice have contributed in no small measure to exclude many from taking up pharmacy as a vocation.

This Advisory Board, speaking for the pharmacists of the State does not in the least deprecate any attempt to improve the educational status of those who engage in pharmacy, realizing as it does that the present times require more thorough mental equipment and scientific training than formerly in pharmacy as well as in any other trade or profession. So long as medicine was more particularly curative, the preparation and compounding of medicines was all that was required of a pharmacist; but with the changes wrought by preventive medicine he should have in addition to a thorough knowledge of the fundamental branches also a fair insight into the biological sciences in order properly to serve the physician and the public.

The faculty of the School has long since recognized this tendency and as you are aware has been promised such facilities as would enable it to institute a third year course. Incidentally it may be suggested that when the State offers to its sons and daughters through this University such splendid opportunities to fit themselves for the vocations of agriculture and mechanic arts and industries, it may also consider the condition of those who devote themselves to the care of the sick and afflicted.

For our present purpose however it is desired to endeavor to get more youths to enter the study of pharmacy and also to secure a better class of educated young men and women.

It is suggested that by including free scholarships in the School of Pharmacy to the graduates of the high schools of the State in the annual offer for scholarships in the University, some may avail themselves of such privilege upon graduation and thus in course of time a steady supply of a superior class of apprentices be secured.

This would serve the two-fold purpose of relieving the present embarrassing situation with reference to good help, elevate the educational standard, and incidentally add to the prestige of the University by presenting perennially its many opportunities in the most practical manner. The only condition for acceptance should be that the candidate shall register as an apprentice in pharmacy.

By presenting such offer to the many high schools throughout the State the University would no doubt derive considerable benefit and a better education in pharmacy be greatly promoted.

MEETING OF MARCH 11, 1902.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois met in the Trustees' room, Library building, Urbana Illinois, at 9 o'clock a.m., Tuesday, March 11, 1902.

The members present were Messrs. Bullard, Hatch, McKay, McLean, Nightingale, and Smith, and Mrs. Carriel, Mrs. Abbott, and Mrs. Alexander; absent, Governor Yates and Messrs. Bayliss and Conrad. President Draper was present.

The minutes of the meeting of December 10, 1901, were approved as presented by the Secretary.

The election of officers being then in order, Mr. T. J. Smith announced that he was not a candidate for re-election.

Mr. A. F. Nightingale was elected President.

Mr. W. L. Pillsbury was elected Corresponding and Recording Secretary and Registrar.

Messrs. Hatch and Smith were elected to constitute, with the President of the Board, the Executive Committee.

PAPERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT DRAPER.

Io the Board of Irustees.

I recommend that the request of Professor Frederick, who has been twelve years in the University's service, for leave of absence for next year under the rule allowing such leave for foreign study on half pay, be granted, and that I be authorized to arrange with Professor Wells to take charge of the department during his absence.

UNIFORMS FOR UNIVERSITY CADETS.

I recommend that the Business Manager acting in conjunction with Major

Fechèt and the Chairman of the Committee on Finance be authorized to advertise for bids to furnish uniforms for the University cadets for the next two years, and to conclude a contract upon receiving a satisfactory bid, and report their action to this board.

COMMERCE AND TRANSPORTATION AND INDUSTRY.

To the Board of Irustees.

Since the last meeting of the Board I have given, in conjunction with Professor Kinley of the department of economics, very careful attention to preparations for the work in commerce, industry, trade, accounts, etc., which we are to inaugurate in September next. Some important results have been arrived at within the last three or four days in the course of a journey which I have made to the eastern states. It is scarcely possible to do more than state to the Board such net results as have been attained and ask its approval. I therefore make the following recommendations:

- 1. That the work be inaugurated in conjunction with that of the department of economics, and that Professor Kinley retain the headship of such department.
- 2. That George M. Fish be appointed professor of commerce in this department, and Maurice H. Robinson professor of industries and transportation, at a salary of \$2,250 each, the appointments to take effect on the first of September, 1902.
- 3. That I be authorized to engage one more teacher who shall give his attention to the subject of accounting, and that the announcements of the department showing courses of instruction and full details be completed and published as soon as practicable.

Professor Fisk, whose appointment is provided for above, is about 36 years of age, is a graduate of the University of Michigan in the class of 1890, and took his doctorate degree at the University of Munich in 1896. He was superintendent of schools in Michigan for three years. He was then secretary of the American Embassy at Berlin four years. He became a professor at Tome Institute, Port Deposit, Maryland, in 1900. He was an instructor in the summer term at Wisconsin University in 1900, and at Johns Hopkins University in 1901, and held the Albert Shaw lectureship at Johns Hopkins University where he is delivering a course of lectures. He is the author of various articles in the public press, and of two books in German, the first a History of German-American diplomatic relations, and the other a commercial history of the United States from 1890 to 1900.

Professor Robinson is 34 years of age; was graduated at Dartmouth in 1890; taught in the public schools in Minnesota from 1890 to 1896; held a fellowship at Dartmouth in 1896; was an instructor there in 1897-'98; took his A. M. degree in 1897; held a fellowship at Yale in 1898 '99; and has been an instructor at Yale since 1899, where he will take his Ph. D. degree this year.

I think both of these men are exceedingly strong and promising and will be great acquisitions in our work.

J. L. Ray's bill of \$90, for legal services and for printing in the case of D. H. Clark vs. The University of Illinois, in the Appellate Court, was approved and ordered paid.

Notices of certain claims against the contractors, Kelly & O'Brien, were referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds.

STREET CAR RIGHT OF WAY.

The following report relative to the attempt of the Urbana and Champaign Street Railway Company to renew its track along the old line was adopted:

URBANA, ILL., March 11, 1902.

To the Board of Trustees:

At the last meeting of the Board of Trustees the Committee on Buildings and Grounds, with President Draper added, was directed to take steps which would prevent the Urbana and Champaign Street Railway Company from operating two lines of road through our grounds, and if possible to reach an adjustment with the company. Immediately after the Board meeting the Committee held a conference with the president and counsel of the road, at which it was agreed that the University should request the city of Urbana to extend the franchise of the company running from the University grounds east to Goodwin avenue and north to the old line of the road for a period of 20 years, and that in consideration of this the road should quit claim any rights which it might have to the strip of land over which it was operated through the University grounds just north of the Machine Shops prior to the laving of the line on Green street.

Pursuant to this, the members of the Committee made very earnest request of the city council of Urbana to grant the extension of franchise. After much urging the council reluctantly did it. It is true that the council amended the franchise as drawn by the counsel of the railroad company in three particulars: (a) By providing that the company should operate a service between Urbana and Champaign as often as every 12 minutes; (b) by making the franchise extend from the east side of the University lands rather than through the University lands to Wright street; and (c) that the franchise should only take effect upon the company giving up all claim to its right of way through the University grounds. In view of the expressed willingness of the president of the railway company to make a ten-minute service

between Champaign and Urbana the Committee is unable to see any objection to either of these amendments. If there is any trouble about the second one it could be arranged by the action of this Board of Trustees, and probably would be by the city council of Urbana upon request. The third is merely carrying out the understanding.

However, the road has refused to accept this franchise and make good its agreement. Nothing was done touching the laying of track and stringing of wires upon the old right of way, however, until yesterday morning, when a large force of men was employed to do the work quickly before the University would be likely to take action; but Mr. Smith, the President of the Board of Trustees, promptly secured an injunction stopping the road from further proceedings, and this is the situation at present.

The University owns the lands upon which the road formerly ran, and which are now in question, subject to a right of way conveyed to the road by Drusilla G. Preble, October 6, 1863, the deed containing the provision that, "If the said railroad shall not be commenced over and through said premises, or if said railroad company shall at any time cease permanently to use and occupy said railroad so constructed, or the said track shall be abandoned, or the route thereof changed so as not to be continued over and through said premises, then in that case the said lands and premises hereby granted shall revert to the party who shall be lawfully entitled to the same."

It is at least ten years since the road has made any pretension to operate cars upon this track. For many years much of the iron has been removed. and it has been impossible to run a car over the tracks. In view of this your Committee is of the opinion that the right of the University to the land is absolute, and that it should be protected. Your Committee therefore offers the following recommendations:

- 1. That counsel be employed and every effort made to enjoin the road from all attempts to use or in any way occupy the old line through the University grounds.
- 2. That in the event of the University not being sustained in its injunction proceedings, and of the road continuing to attempt to operate two lines through the University grounds, the Secretary of this Board be directed to notify the railroad company promptly that the privilege heretofore granted the company to operate a line through the University grounds near to and parallel with Green street, is revoked and withdrawn, and that the company must forthwith remove its tracks and wires from said last mentioned line, and that in case the company refuses or neglects to do this for a period of twenty days after the sending of such notice, the Superintendent of Buildings be directed with such help as he may find necessary to employ, to stop the operation of cars over said line, and remove all track and appliance belonging to the company and found thereon.

WHEREAS, The Trustees of the University of Illinois have seen fit to commemorate the name and honor the labors of Prof. George E. Morrow, former Dean of the College of Agriculture, in naming the beautiful audience room in the Agricultural Building "Morrow Hall."

Resolved. That we commend the Board of Trustees for this action, and we recommend that steps be taken to secure, for the use in decorating the walls of this room, a portrait of this man whom the farmers of Illinois remember with profound respect.

PORTRAITS OF PRESIDENTS PEABODY AND DRAPER AND PROFESSOR SNYDER.

URBANA, March 11, 1902.

To the Board of Trustees:

The Committee on Instruction to which was referred the matter of portraits in oil for the University, recommends that the President of the University be authorized and requested to secure if possible within two years from date, a good oil portrait of Dr. Selim H. Peabody, President of the University from 1880 to 1891, one of Professor Edward Snyder, Professor in the University from 1868 to 1896, and of Dr. Andrew S. Draper, President since 1894. The committee further recommends that the portraits of Presidents Peabody and Draper be substantially the same size as that of President Gregory, now in the room of the Board of Tustees, and that the one of Professor Snyder be substantially the same size as those of the professors now in the same room.

Io the Board of Irustees.

The Committee on Buildings and Grounds reports that about the middle of February Mr. Fred L. Peterson resigned as Superintendent of Buildings, the same to take effect March I. The Committee being in session at the University about that time the matter was fully considered and the recommendation of President Draper, that the duties of the Superintendent of Buildings be transferred for the time being to the Superintendent of the Central Heating Station, was accepted. Your Committee now recommends that for the rest of the year Mr. Joseph Morrow be charged with the responsibilities of both positions, and that he be allowed, with the approval of the President of University, to employ a clerk or assistant at a salary of \$50 per month; and that while Mr. Morrow continues to fill both positions his salary be at the rate of \$1,500 yer year the same to commence March 1.

NEW CHEMICAL LABORATORY.

The Committee on Buildings and Grounds made the following report which was adopted, and the appropriation recommended was made.

URBANA, March 11, 1902.

To the Board of Trustees:

Your Committee on Buildings and Grounds desires to report in regard to the heating, ventilation, and plumbing of the new chemical laboratory that since letting the general contract for the building it has been evident that we should be able to complete the building within the appropriation only with the most rigid economy. We have felt also that it was not desirable to cheapen unduly or complete unsatisfactorily any portion of the work but rather to make plain and substantial, and yet attractive withal, all parts of the work still to be done. With this end in view we had the specifications for the heating, ventilation, and plumbing of the building prepared; and we took the further precaution to have bids called for in several ways, so that we could have the choice of having a part or all of the work done at once.

February 28, your Committee received the following sealed proposals for doing all this work:

Field, Shorb & Co.'s proposal included also a deduction of \$858.78 for omitting the plumbing of one toilet room on each floor and \$553.73 for omitting the water, waste, and gas supplies to the second and third stories of the south wing of the building and \$399.38 for omitting the steam supply and radiators for the same two stories of the south wing. It was further ascertained that they would make a reduction of \$500.00 for omitting a small fan for ventilating the lecture room and connecting the ventilating pipes of the lecture room with the pipes of the larger fans.

It was decided to accept the proposal of Field, Shorb & Co. with these deductions and make an equivalent change by finishing a part of each wing instead of leaving one wing unfinished; and it was ordered that contracts be drawn up and signed to that effect in the sum of \$10,859.80.

Your Committee reports further that V. Jobst & Sons, contractors for the general work on the laboratory, came upon a large area of quicksand in placing the foundation for the building. In order to make the building secure, it became necessary to put the foundation below the quicksand. Reasonable terms were agreed upon with Mr. Jobst for this extra work and the architect and chairman of your Committee ordered it done. The architect has measured this work and certifies to your Committee that we should pay for it \$3,770.88. We therefore present the bill of V. Jobst & Sons for this amount and recommend its payment.

Your Committee is having estimates obtained for some of the desks for the new laboratory with the purpose of having some desks made; but we expect to have such of the old desks in the present laboratory placed in the new as will bear transfer, the same to be used as a temporary necessity.

REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION.

President Draper presented the following recommendations from the University Senate with regard to entrance requirements:

Beginning with the year 1903-'04 there will be required for entrance to all the colleges, nine credits in English and nine credits in mathematics (including solid geometry) and additional subjects for the separate college as follows:

In the College of Literature and Arts-Nine credits in foreign language, three credits in history.

For the Colleges of Engineering, Science, and Agriculture—Six credits in physical and biological science.

For the College of Law—English and American History, three credits, and any subjects in elective list to make up necessary number of credits. The elective list as published in the current catalogue is amended by striking out manual training and by substituting three to nine credits in history and three to twelve credits in German for those now accepted.

That beginning with September, 1903, the number of credits for admission to all the colleges be forty; from September, 1905, and thereafter, these credits be forty-two.

This paper was referred to the Committee on Instruction, and by that Committee amended by providing that candidates for admission to the Colleges of Literature and Arts, Science, Agriculture, and Law may offer in lieu of solid and spherical geometry, three credits in history or three in foreign language study in addition to the requirements in these subjects.

The recommendation thus amended was adopted.

THE DEGREES OF A.B. AND B.S.

President Draper presented the following recommendation from the University Senate with regard to the degrees of A.B. and B.S.:

That the degree of A.B. be given in the College of Science, except that the degree of B.S. may be given on recommendation of the head of the department in which the degree is to be taken and approved by the college faculty.

The recommendation was adopted.

HONORARY DEGREES.

President Draper presented from the University Senate the following recommendations with regard to procedure in conferring honorary degrees.

- 1. That such degree be never conferred as a mere compliment but only in recognition of distinguished services or eminent accomplishments.
- 2. That the degree be never conferred except at the annual commencement or at some unusual University celebration.
- 3. That action leading to an honorary degree be consummated by the Faculty at least two months before the time for conferring the degree.
 - 4. That the recipient attend in person to receive the degree.
- 5. That the University prepare and bestow upon the recipient the academic hood significant of the degree.

The recommendations were adopted with the amendment that the faculty notify the Board of Trustees, not later than the regular meeting next preceding that at which a recommendation for conferring an honorary degree would be formally presented, of its intention to make such a recommendation.

The President and Secretary were authorized to sign a petition, addressed to the Board of Local Improvements of the City of Champaign, for the paving of Wright street from the south line of Daniel street to the south end of said Wright street.

WATER WORKS PLANT.

The Committee on Buildings and Grounds made the following report with regard to the Water Works Plant, and the report was accepted:

Io the Board of Irustees:

URBANA, ILL., March 11, 1902.

Your Committee on Buildings and Grounds desires to report that the water works plant is now complete and in working order. Water is now furnished from our own wells in all parts of the University excepting to the President's house and the green house which are connected directly with the city mains. Work is now going on to connect these buildings with our own mains.

The storage reservoir, which is mainly to provide a reserve of water in case of fire, is located on the north side of the creek. We have had \$1,000 from the fire protection fund applied on the construction of the reservoir. The work has been completed within the water supply appropriations. The whole system is an excellent one and reflects much credit upon the ability of Professor Talbot who planned the system and had the responsibility of its construction.

The wells supply an abundance of good water; but it appears from the amount required to supply our growing institution that at no distant day additional wells will have to be sunk to increase the supply. We are now using from the two wells which we have about 100,250 gallons per day. The capacity of our two wells does not much exceed this amount.

Io the Board of Irustees:

Last summer the Board directed the Finance Committee, in conjunction with President Draper, to apportion the special appropriation of \$15,000 made for furnithre and equipment in the new buildings provided for in the emergency appropriation act of 1901 between the different buildings, and in pursuance of this direction the Committee allotted \$7,500 to the Laboratory of Applied Mechanics, \$4,000 to the Wood Shop, and \$3,500 to the Gymnasium. This allotment was made upon the supposition that the lockers in the Gymnasium would be provided for in the builder's contract. The conditions prevented this from being done, and accordingly it has been necessary

to pay for the lockers out of this appropriation for furnishing and equipment. About 600 lockers have been contracted for, at a cost of \$2,662. One thousand or \$1,200 will be needed, but if necessary the additional number can be delayed. However, a reallotment is necessary, and your Committee recommends that it be made as follows: To the Gymnasium, \$5,000; to the Laboratory of Applied Mechanics, \$6,500; to the Wood Shop, \$3,500.

## University Postoffice.

President Draper offered the following recommendation, which was adopted:

URBANA, ILL., March 11, 1902.

Io the Board of Irustees:

For some time it has been growing more and more manifest that there will eventually have to be some radical change concerning postoffice accommodations and mail facilities for the University. I have accordingly corresponded with the postoffice department and inquired whether the department would be disposed to maintain a station of the Urbana postoffice at the University, giving it a name selected by the University. The department has advised me that it would do so, and would appoint a person upon the recommendation of the University to have charge of said office and pay him for it, say \$300 per year, provided the University would give a room heated, lighted, and rurnished for the use of such station. Inquiry also leads me to believe that the mails would be carried between the station and Urbana as usual, and that this arrangement would not interfere with the usual free delivery system which we now enjoy under the Urbana postoffice. I am led to believe that such an arrangement would be a very great accommodation to the University, its faculties and students in many ways, and I recommend that you authorize the completion by the President of such a plan as this upon the terms suggested.

Mrs. Abbott offered the following resolutions with regard to the School of Pharmacy:

Resolved, That a two-year scholarship system be adopted for the School of Pharmacy—one scholarship for each county, and one for each of the first ten Congressional districts of Cook county. That these scholarships be awarded to graduates of high schools upon competitive examination, as is the case with State scholarships; and that those succeeding shall register as apprentices in pharmacy.

Resolved, That evening classes in inorganic chemistry be arranged to begin with the school year of 1902, upon reasonable term fees, and that the Committee on Pharmacy report at the June meeting any necessary expenses for instruction, or otherwise, which may result.

The first of these resolutions failed of adoption, and the Secretary was directed to inform Mr. A. E. Ebert, of the Advisory Board of the School of Pharmacy, that such action had been taken.

The second resolution was referred to President Draper and the Committee on Pharmacy for investigation and report.

The matter of renewing the lease of the property now occupied by the School of Pharmacy was referred to the Business Manager and President Draper, with power to act.

# University Dining Hall.

It was voted to continue the dining hall for next year, but not under the present management, and the Secretary was directed to inform Mrs. Gibbs of this action.

The Chairman of the Committee on Students' Welfare was given authority to arrange for the management of the dining hall, with some suitable person, upon the terms of the present contract.

#### TEMPORARY LEAVE OF ABSENCE.

Miss Alison Marion Fernie, Professor of Voice, has recently been seriously ill and suffered a somewhat serious surgical operation. She is advised by her physicians that she should not resume work before the 1st of November, but that she may expect to do so at that time. In view of the high character of her work and the efficiency of her service, I recommend that leave of absence, without loss of pay, be granted until the 1st of November.

#### SUPERINTENDENT OF BUILDINGS.

The experiment commenced in the spring, by which the Superintendent of the Central Heating Station was given charge of buildings, has proved even more satisfactory than was expected. Mr. Morrow has shown great ability and marked activity and faithfulness in the broader field. I therefore recommend that he be appointed Superintendent of Buildings, with the understanding that this carries with it the superintendency of the Heating Station and of everything except the grounds, and that his salary be \$1,600 a year.

Mr. Morrow has heretofore employed men in the Central Heating Station and has paid them by the hour instead of by the day or month. He thinks the plan works well and saves much feeling among employés. He is anxious to extend the plan to the janitor force. While I have had some doubts about this plan, I am in favor of allowing him to try it, and I advise that his recommendations, contained in the two communications herewith transmitted, covering the employment of labor and repairs upon the plant, be carried out as approved by the Committee on Buildings and Grounds.

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#### WAGES.

The question of wages of employés also needs consideration. The demand for labor has increased the price of same to such an extent that it is now practically impossible for us to secure good reliable men at the price we have been paying, as common labor is now worth from 15 to 20 cents an hour. In my judgment the saving made in keeping competent help will more than overbalance a slight increase in wages.

Therefore I respectfully ask to be allowed to employ all of our help by the hour. This would include the janitors, University police, and the employés of the power plant. From my previous experience in obtaining labor for the University, I believe that more satisfactory service can be obtained under such an arrangement. I would therefore recommend that I be authorized to make the following scale of wages:

University police.	15 to 20 cents an hour
Power plant employés.	12 ¹ ₂ to 25 cents an hour
Janitors	12 ¹ ₂ to 16 ² ₃ cents an hour

The maximum prices are to be applied to the most competent help only. It is understood that in all cases the best help shall be secured at as low a price as possible, consistent with the character of the work to be performed.

# TILE DRAINAGE ON SOUTH FARM.

The Chairman of the Committee on Agriculture presented the following report which was adopted.

URBANA, ILL., June 9, 1902.

To the Board of Irustees of the University of Illinois:

Your Committee to which was referred the matter of tile drainage on the south farm begs leave to submit the following report:

Engineers were hired and lines run from the ponds which were to be drained.

The minimum depth of tile laid in two feet and the maximum depth is seven and one-half feet.

There were 2,124 feet of 6 inch tile 1,248 feet 5 inch tile, 1,003 feet 4 inch tile, and 80 feet of sewer tile used, making a total of 4,455 feet of tile put in. The expense was:

The expense a foot or rod is high, because much of this tiling was done at a depth of six and seven feet, in order to make the lines as short as possible and also to keep the lines on our own property rather than use the old and longer lines that ran through other property. All old lines that were disturbed were reconnected. They were generally found in fair working order, but the tile were too small to carry the water off soon enough to save the crops.

Enclosed with this report are dupliacate bills for all money expended. Also blue-prints of both preliminary and final lines showing location, depth, etc. Your Committee asks that these prints be put on file and kept by the Secretary.

## CONTRACT WITH KELLY & O'BRIEN.

Io the Board of Trustees:

Your Committee on Buildings and Grounds begs leave to report that the contract with Kelly & O'Brien, of Chicago, for the Hydraulic Laboratory, the Wood Shops, and the Gymnasium has been completed excepting a few unimportant matters and the Committee has accepted the buildings.

The architect, Mr. Spencer, reports to us that the work has been well done and that a great many delays, which occurred in construction, were largely due to difficulties in obtaining materials for construction.

The contractors did a great deal of extra work owing to changes made during the construction and have made claims for a great deal of work which your committee holds is covered by the contract. Your Committee has carefully gone over all these claims and finds that the amount due the contractors for extra work is \$3,441.88, and that the amount to be deducted because of changes favorable to the University is \$395.84, which leaves a balance due for extra work of \$3.046.04. We, therefore, recommend that you authorize your Committee and the Business Manager to settle with the contractors on the basis of \$3,046.04 in addition to the contract price.

## ADJOURNED SESSION JUNE 30, 1902.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois met pursuant to adjournment at 10 o'clock a.m., June 30, 1902, at the President's House, Urbana, Ill.

The members present were Messrs. Bullard, Hatch, McKay, Nightingale, Smith and Mrs. Carriel, Mrs. Abbott, and Mrs. Alexnder; absent, Governor Yates and Messrs. Bayliss, Conrad, and McLean. President Draper was present.

#### COMMUNICATION FROM PRESIDENT DRAPER.

URBANA, ILL., June 30, 1902.

#### Io the Board of Irustees:

I respectfully present the following recommendations:

- 1. That John Hancock McClellan be re-appointed instructor in zoôlogy for ten months from September 1, 1902, at \$100 a month.
- 2. That the salary of Charles Frederick Hottes be \$1,200, of which \$700 shall be charged to the University; \$200 to the United States Station fund; \$300 to the State Station fund.
- 3. I transmit a petition signed by many students asking for the favor of the University authorities in starting a co-operative book store. It involves our recommendation of the movement as a legitimate student enterprise, and our giving them a room for the purpose without charge. I recommend that they be given.
- 4. I recommend that the sum of \$600 be appropriated to the department of geology, of which \$300 may be used for compensation of an assistant for half time, and \$300 for equipment and supplies.
- 5. Last year the department of physiology very earnestly asked for an appropriation of \$2 000 for much needed equipment. One thousand dollars was granted with some intimation that the remainder of the sum asked for might be given a year later. Although the sum is considerable and the necessity for care is pressing, the department has never had much help and is of first importance and I recommend that it be given the sum of \$1,000 for equipment.
- 6. Some time ago Dillard H. Clark, Captain, U. S. Army, retired, brought suit against the University for salary claimed to be unpaid and due him as professor of military science. The case was tried before a jury in the circuit court of Champaign county and a verdict rendered for the University. From the judgment an appeal was taken. The Appellate Court has just handed down its decision, framing its judgment in favor of the University. The opinion of the court discusses the case with considerable detail and sustains the contentions of the University at every point, and the points are of considerable importance in our regular affairs. It is held that the contract was to be determined by the letters passing between the President of the University and the plaintiff, and at the time suit was brought Captain Clark was owing the University, rather than the University owing him. As the Trustees acted very largely upon my view of the matter I have special satisfaction in the fact that we have been so decisively sustained by the courts.
- 7. I transmit herewith a list of the faculty of the College of Medicine for next year, as recommended by the executive committee of the faculty. I recommend approval, except as to the appointment of a Vice Dean, pending action upon that question which is now in the hands of the Board. The list is as follows:

The matter has been urged upon the agricultural people of taking the south farm for our own uses and the way is opened for action to the end desired. I present the following letter from Dean Davenport upon this and some other subjects, and advise that his recommendations be approved.

#### COLLEGE OF AGRICULTURE.

URBANA, ILL.. June 26, 1902.

### A. S. Draper, LL.D., President of the University of Illinois:

DEAR SIR-1 understand that the consideration of the south farm was left over for the special meeting of June 30, and that some further report is desirable at this time.

I beg leave to report that in accordance with your instruction I have discussed the whole matter with heads of departments to learn their needs both as to additional lands and also as to the surrendering of lands now occupied by the experiment farm, on account of need of space for a south campus, or park. The result of our discussion is the following suggestion, which from our standpoint would seem the most feasible thing to be done.

The most valuable lands to us are the platted portions devoted to permanent soil experiment in which the particular spot comes to have a value that time only can give. Next to these in value are those portions covered by orchards, and last but not least, some land near at hand for students' work. All these portions lie in the nort half of the experiment farm.

On the south half we would like to have sufficient space on which to place barns and yards to quarter, at least temporarily, some of the best portion of the herds of cattle and the driving horses. Everything else to be removed to the south farm.

Believing that space to the east is more valuable for a park than that to the west the suggestion is that we surrender some 20 acres of the southeast portion of this farm according to the plan herewith submitted, which with the forestry and approaches would make a total of about 40 acres. This can be reached by drive from Burrill Avenue and by foot over the broad grass approach at the end of Mathews Avenue. Besides this the platted lands of 15 acres with the well sodded intervening spaces is also available for strolling and is never unsightly. On the contrary it is of peculiar interest to very many. This would throw open about 65 acres, some 20 of which would be in a solid block suitable for planting with between 15 and 20 acres in forest, and with platted land on the north. It may be well to call attention to the fact that a broad sodded strip two rods wide leads along the north side of the platted lands to the forest. This suggestion is presented because it is the plan which will interfere with our needs the least, and which, so far as we are able to see, will serve the public the best.

Professor Mumford would like authority to erect a shelter for feed at an expense at approximately \$1,200 and in such shape as to be available for sheltering animals after more permanent barns shall be erected. The appropriation of this amount from receipts of the State Station is asked.

As to the division of the south farm, the following assignments are requested, as indicated in the plan presented herewith:

That of the ten forty-acre areas in the farm, the three east forties be assigned to the department of dairy husbandry, the two to the southeast to the department of agronomy, and the remaining five to the department of animal husbandry, and that later an area of approximately ten acres be set off for apple orchard, on such portion as is found most suitable for the purpose,

The department of animal husbandry greatly needs cold storage for meats, that of horticulture for fruits, and that of agronomy for sugar beets and for culture of bacteria, requiring cool temperatures. Permission is requested to construct such rooms adjacent to the present cooling rooms in the dairy wing according to the sketch herewith presented.

The expense will be entirely for insulation, brine tanks, and pipe, estimated by Mr. Erf at \$1,000. If constructed the principal expense should be met by State station funds and divided substantially as follows: Animal husbandry \$600. State station fund; agronomy \$200, sugar beet fund; horticulture \$200, college fund.

The ammonia pump and the power are entirely adequate to this additional work; indeed the plant was installed with this in mind as it has been anticipated from the first. It is desired to make detail plans and engage material during the summer and begin work Sept. 1.

It was the intention in my last report to ask for the appropriation of certain receipts. I understand from the Business Manager that the manuscript was not clear upon this point. I would therefore, at this time, request the appropriation of the following amounts all from receipts:

9. The College of Law has subscribed for a reprint edition of the English Common Law reports from 1307-1865. It is being delivered a few volumes each year and being paid for out of the College allotment from the library funds. This publication, however, does not cover the period from 1865 to

date. An opportunity is now presented to secure the reports for the later period through a Boston house, on exceedingly favorable terms, for the sum of \$550, which is quite \$75 or \$100 less than I have known them to be sold for. No law school can be without them. Ours cannot buy them from any ordinary allotment of funds. I therefore recommend that the sum of \$550 be appropriated for that purpose:

Resolved, That no one connected with the University in any capacity shall use for his own pleasure, or for any other personal purpose, any University property of whatever description; and no one shall be permitted to remove from the buildings or grounds of the University anything belonging to the University, even though it may seem to be of no value, unless it be temporarily and pursuant to some well established regulation or usage. or with the distinct approval of the President or Business Manager of the University.

11. I recommend that an additional assistant in the library be allowed at \$20 a month, half time with all of Saturday.

The foregoing recommendations were severally adopted and appointments and appropriations were made in accordance therewith, with the following exceptions:

Item No. 4 was referred to the Committee on Agriculture to investigate and report as to whether or not a part of the amount appropriated should be charged to the agricultural department. At a later hour of the meeting the Committee reported against so charging any part of the appropriation and the recommendation was adopted as made.

Item No. 8 was referred to the Committee on Agriculture for investigation and report, and at a later hour, upon recommendation of the Committee, was adopted as presented.

The action of the Board whereby, at its session of June 9, 1902, it adopted the recommendations of the executive committee of the faculty of the College of Medicine touching expenditures of the College and of the Dental School, was reconsidered, and the recommendations were referred to the Committee on the College of Medicine for investigation and report.

Mrs Caddie Sanger of Peoria was heard upon the question of instruction in music in the country schools, and the subject, together with some papers left by Mrs. Sanger, was referred for consideration to the Committee on Instruction, to which was added for this purpose, President Draper and Mr. Smith.

President Draper stated that he had received word from Professor Charles Wesley Tooke, of the College of Law, that he would be absent from the University during the ensuing University year. The President was authorized to take such measures as might be necessary in the premises with regard to instruction in the College of Law.

PAVEMENT ON MATHEWS AND SPRINGFIELD AVENUES AND ROMINE STREET.

Mr. Smith presented the following statement with regard to the assessment against the University for the paving of Mathews and Springfield avenues and Romine street, and the action taken was approved.

URBANA, ILL, June 30, 1902.

To the Board of Irustees of the University of Illinois:

The City of Urbana passed an order to pave a portion of Mathews and Springfield Avenues and part of Romine street, and the County Court approved and made an order appointing a Commissioner to assess benefits to the abutting property.

The Commissioner to assess benefits made a report to the Court of his assessments.

This assessment makes the University pay \$4.12 per foot while private property owners pay only \$2.47 per foot.

Notice was served on the Secretary of the Board that such assessment was made and that the University should show cause why such assessment should not be confirmed by the County Court on June 9th, which notice was handed me, with request to give the matter attention. Realizing that the assessment was greatly unjust, illegal and inequitable, I requested Mr. J. L. Ray to assist me in resisting said assessment.

Mr. Nightingale, the president of the Board, being in Champaign I called his attention to the matter and told him what I had done, which he approved and advised me to make such defense as we could.

The cause came to hearing before the County Court on June 16th, and it was held by the County Court that as to the University the proceeding was wholly illegal and the proceeding was dismissed. By the defense we defeated the payment and thereby saving to the University \$3,014.00.

An appeal was prayed to the Supreme Court by the city of Urbana; whether the case will be taken up I can not say.

## PAVEMENT ON SOUTH WRIGHT STREET.

Questions having arisen as to whether or not the University was liable under the assessment made for paving the two south blocks on Wright street in Champaign, the Board adopted the following resolutions:

Resolved. By the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois that it ratifies and confirms every step and action taken to pave South Wright street in Champaign from the south end thereof to the south line of Daniel street, including the legal sufficiency of the petition, the action of the Board of

Local Improvements, the passage of the ordinance by the said city to pave said street, and the action and judgment of the County Court on said ordinance and petition to pave the said street, and also approves of the amount of the assessment of benefits to the University and its property; and, further

Resolved, That the Business Manager of the University be, and he is hereby, directed to pay, after the said city of Champaign certifies that the contractor has completed the said pavement according to the plans and specifications, the several installments of the assessment on or before the same fall due.

The Board adjourned to meet at 3:00 o'clock p. m.

Session of Monday Afternoon, June 30, 1902.

When the Board met pursuant to adjournment, the same members were present as during the morning session.

Mrs. Carriel from the Committee on Students' Welfare, reported that an agreement had been made with Mr. L. C. Miller to conduct the University Dining Hall and Lunch Room on the same terms as were made with Mrs. Gibbs for last year, except that the University should furnish some heavy articles needed, and that certain articles had been purchased from Mrs. Gibbs, for which \$900 had been paid. She also recommended that certain repairs and improvements be made, and the question of making these was referred to the Committee on Buildings and Grounds and Mrs. Carriel, with power to act.

## CATALOGUE PRINTING.

The Secretary stated that the catalogue for 1901-1902, printed by Messrs. Hack & Anderson of Chicago, did not seem to fulfill the terms of the contract made in regard to its printing. It was moved that a deduction of 10 per cent on the bill be demanded. An amendment was offered that a discount of 5 per cent be demanded; the amendment was lost and the original motion then prevailed.

## ELECTRIC LIGHTING PLANT.

The Committee on Buildings and Grounds presented the following report with regard to the enlargement of the Electric Light Plant, and the report was adopted.

URBANA, ILL., June 30, 1902.

To the Board of Trustees:

Your Committee on Buildings and Grounds desires to report concerning an enlargement of the Electric Light Plant of the University. Professors Breckenridge and Brooks prepared specifications and requirements and asked for proposals from electrical machinery manufacturers. They received proposals from the General Electric Co., Schenectady, N. Y.; Stanley Electric Mfg. Co., of Pittsfield, Mass.: Westinghouse Electric Mfg. Co., of Pittsburg, Pa.; Bullock Electric Mfg. Co., of Cincinnati, Ohio. The lowest bid was from the Bullock Co., for an Ide direct-connected engine, guaranteed by the company to be satisfactory, at a price of \$4,875. The professors preferred the machine and engine of the Westinghouse Co. at a price of \$5,000, and they so recommend to your Committee. The Committee accepted the recommendation of the professors and ordered the purchase of a 120-kilowat capacity,

direct-connected engine-dynamo machine for \$5,000, and the return of one 45-kilowat belted dynamo with exciter. This has been done and the contract for the same filed with the Secretary.

Your Committee also ordered the installation of the above engine and dynamo in the Electrical Laboratory at an expense of \$1,000.

Your Committee further ordered that electric wire and connections be laid in the tunnels, made necessary by the new Chemical Laboratory and the fitting up of the new law building, at an expense of \$900.

AGRICULTURAL EXPERIMENT STATION.

To the Board of Irustees of the University of Illinois:

Gentlemen—During the last biennial period the work of the Agricultural College and Experiment Station has been greatly extended through an act of the Forty-second General Assembly, approved May 10, 1901. The scope of the work and the provisions for its execution are best set forth by the act itself which is as follows:

An Act to provide appropriations for the equipment of the College of Agriculture and the extension of the work of the Agricultural Experiment Station.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly: That it shall be the duty of the College of Agriculture to maintain typical specimens representing the various market classes and the several pure breeds of live stock, and to give expert instruction in stock judging, and in the most advanced and approved methods of live stock husbandry.

That it shall be the duty of the Agricultural Experiment Station to conduct feeding experiments intended to determine the most successful combinations of stock foods, particularly in Illinois grains and forage crops, and to discover the most economical and successful methods of maintaining animals and fitting them for the markets; to investigate live stock conditions, both at home and abroad, in so far as they affect market values, and to publish the results of such experiments and investigations. That to carry out the provisions of this section there be, and hereby is, appropriated the sum of sixteen thousand dollars (\$16,000) annually for the years 1901 and 1902, of which sum eight thousand (\$8,000) is to be set aside annually for live stock feeding experiments, etc.: Provided, that the work undertaken and outlined in this section shall be carried out on lines to be agreed upon by the dean of the College of Agriculture, and a committee of five to be appointed by the Illinois Live Stock Breeders' Association.

- 22. That it shall be the duty of the Agricultural Experiment Station to conduct experiments in the several sections of the State, in order to discover the best methods of producing corn on the different soils and under the various climatic conditions of the State, and for the purpose of improving the varieties grown for special purposes, combating insects, enemies, etc., and that, to carry out the provisions of this section, there be, and hereby is, appropriated the sum of ten thousand dollars (10,000) annually for the years 1901 and 1902. Provided that the work outlined in this section shall be carried out on lines to be agreed upon by the director of the Agricultural Experiment Station and a committee of five to be appointed by the Illinois Corn Growers' Association, the Corn Breeders' Association, and the Illinois Grain Dealers' Association.
- §3. That it shall be the duty of the Agricultural Experiment Station to make chemical and physical examinations of the various soils of the State, and to determine the character and location of their several classes; to ascertain what crops and treatment are best suited to each; whether the present methods are tending to the preservation or the reduction of their fertility.

and what rotation and treatment will be most effective in increasing and retaining the productive capacity of Illinois lands; and that, to carry out the provisions of this section, there be, and hereby is, appropriated the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) annually, for the years 1901 and 1902: Provided, that the work outlined in this section shall be carried out on lines to be agreed upon by the director of the Agricultural Experiment Station and a committee of five to be appointed by the Illinois Farmers' Institute,

- §4. That it shall be the duty of the Agricultural Experiment Station to discover and demonstrate the best methods of orchard treatment in the fruit sections of the State, and the most effective remedies for insect and fungous enemies to fruit and trees; and that, to carry out the provision of this section, there be, and hereby is, appropriated the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) annually, for the years 1901 and 1902: Provided, that the work undertaken and outlined in this section shall be carried out on lines to be agreed upon by the director of the Agricultural Experiment Station and a committee of five to be appointed by the Illinois State Horticultural Society.
- §5. That it shall be the duty of the Agricultural Experiment Station to investigate the dairy conditions of the State, and to discover and demonstrate improved methods of producing and marketing wholesome milk and other dairy products; and that, to carry out the provisions of this section, there be, and hereby is, appropriated the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) annually, for the years 1901 and 1902: Provided, that the work undertaken and outlined in this section shall be carried out on lines to be agreed upon by the director of the Agricultural Experiment Station and a committee of five to be appointed by the Illinois Dairymen's Association.
- §6. That it shall be the duty of the Agricultural Experiment Station to investigate and demonstrate the best methods of seeding, cultivating and marketing sugar beets on the various soils to be found in the several sections of the State; and that, to carry out the provisions of this section, there be, and hereby is, appropriated the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000) annually, for the years 1901 and 1902: Provided, that the work undertaken and outlined in this section shall be carried out on lines to be agreed upon by the director of the Agricultural Experiment Station and a committee of five to be appointed by the Illinois Sugar Beet Growers' Association.
- §7. That the committees representing the several associations herein named shall meet annually at the College of Agriculture at Urbana, at such time as may be designated by the dean of said college, that they shall serve without compensation except for expenses, to be paid out of the respective funds, and that said committees shall make their respective associations, at their annual meetings, full reports of the work in progress under the provisions of this act.
- §8. That the Auditor of Public Accounts is hereby authorized and directed to draw his warrant on the State Treasurer for the sum herein appropriated upon the order of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, countersigned by its Secretary, and with the corporate seal of said University: Provided, that no part of the funds herein appropriated shall be used for salaries of teachers: And, provided further, that any revenue arising from the operations of the several sections of this act shall revert to the respective funds from which obtained for further extension of the work outlined. Nothing herein contained shall be deemed to take away from the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois the usual authority conferred by law over the expenditure of moneys appropriated to said University. The recommendations of the committee herein provided for shall be advisory, but the use of the moneys herein appropriated shall rest in the discretion of said Board for the purposes herein set forth, and said Board shall account therefor.

Approved May 10, 1901.

No new organization was created under the provisions of this act except the advisory committees, the University doing its work by extending the old organization and increasing the number of employees.

At this writing the act has been in operation less than eighteen months, yet exceedingly important work has been accomplished in all the lines provided for, perhaps with the single exception of the sugar beets in which progress has only been fairly satisfactory. The nature and scope of this work is best set forth in the bulletins and circulars that have already been issued, which are as follows:

This represents but a small portion of the work actually finished and in preparation for the press, and a still smaller proportion of the real advance made in investigation along agricultural lines of special interest to Illinois.

The provisions of this act make this the most heavily endowed Agricultural Experiment Station in the world, and it should in good time exert a profound influence upon the agriculture of the State. Results up to date have exceeded expectations, and so far as is known to the writer all parties involved are thoroughly satisfied.

Since the issue of last biennial report the Agricultural Experiment Station has issued bulletins Nos. 60-78, inclusive, two annual reports, and circulars Nos. 26-60, inclusive.
